Want Three Rivers Road Graded to 24 Feet Wide.
The State Highway Commission in conjunction with the County Court of Tillamook County, petitioned the Department of Agriculture that the Three Rivers road, from Hebo to the Sour Grass road, be graded 24 feet wide and surfaced 16 feet wide with waterbound macadam. The present project calls for a 16 foot road.
Practically all of the traffic to the Tillamook beaches passes over this road and amounts to about 1,000 touring cars per day during the summer, at this time although the adjacent section in the Grand Ronde Valley Indian Reservation is very rough and narrow, and only passable in dry weather. The Grand Ronde section which is the last bad stretch of road on this highway, will be eliminated during 1918, and, therefore, the travel will be increased considerably.
In the southern part of Tillamook county the dairymen are now shipping grain from Portland to Tillamook (112 miles) and hauling the same by auto truck a distance of from 20 to 30 miles. When the Three Rivers road and the Grand Ronde section are completed, this grain can be hauled by truck from the Willamette Valley at a saving of from \$3 to \$5 per ton, and it is estimated that 5,000 tons of grain and other feed will be handled over this route each year when the same is completed.
It is evident that the increase in traffic will be such that a 16 foot grade and a 9 foot surface will be entirely inadequate and the expense of widening the road, macadamizing and lengthening culverts will be much more if done in the future than if cared for at the present time. The roadbed is now being widened to 24 feet in all of the highway from Portland to Tillamook, and when present plans are completed the Three Rivers road will be the only section with a 16 foot grade. This will tend to concentrate the traffic of a 24 foot roadway upon a 16 foot roadway, making maintenance charges very expensive.
It is proposed that the cost of grading the road 24 feet wide will be borne equally by Tillamook County, the State and Federal government.
