We are sorry to announce the death of C. Christensen, one of the old residents of Tillamook county, which occurred at his home in Portland on Wednesday morning. He had been sick for over a week with heart trouble, and this was the cause of his death. He was aged 72 years, 9 months and 9 days.

The deceased was born in Denmark and he came to the United States when 18 years of age, locating first at Netarts, where he engaged in the oyster business.

Subsequently he took up a homestead in the Nestucca Valley and became one of the prosperous and successful dairymen of that section. In 1905 he retired from the farm and with his wife resided in Portland. He leaves a wife and six children, viz., Will Christensen, of Oretown; F. W. Christensen, of Tillamook; Walter Christensen, of Coos Bay; Claud Christensen, of Bay City; Mrs. Chas. Cater, and Loring Christensen, of Portland.
