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**Knocking the City's Pay Roll.**

Everybody knows that it is pay rolls that count in the upbuilding of a city or county. Before, however, there can be pay rolls there must be some enterprising citizens who invest large amounts of money in building saw mills and factories, and it is up to the business men of every city that they see to it that they receive fair treatment. As an illustration of this the A. F. Coats Lumber Co. came to this city and bought out the old lumber company's property. Since then the company has expended large sums of money improving the saw mill, establishing logging camps and given considerable employment at good wages to those needing work, as well as circulating large amounts of money every month. Every business man in the city have been greatly benefited by having this institution in our midst, and, for our part, we are sorry that we have not more industries of a like nature. The citizens and business men, for the most part, appreciate what the A. F. Coats Lumber Co. have done in providing a pay roll and in helping the industrial development of the city. Along comes a labor agitator, whom nobody knows and is a perfect stranger, and trouble commences immediately, on account of an effort to unionize the saw mill. We contend that if the A. F. Coats Lumber Co. want to run their saw mill in the way they think best, no one has a right to interfere with them. No other business in the city is being interfered with, and not one of them have adopted the eight hour day for their help which the lumber company has done. Men seeking employment went to the company and applied for work, and arrangements were made to start the mill, although the lumber market did not justify the company in doing so. Notwithstanding this most of the employees went over to the labor agitator and as a result the saw mill is closed down and a number of men have been deprived of work to pay their store bills. But the point we are driving at is this: Are the citizens and business men going to side in with a labor agitator and those who take up his cause, or the company who is furnishing the city with a good pay roll? If the business men of this city coincide with the scullerous editorial that appeared in the last issue of the Herald, then this is no place for the A. F. Coats Lumber Co. or any enterprising concern to locate. It is exceedingly unfortunate for the reputation of the city that the boys of the saw mill company should be abused in that manner. It is not generally known that a strong effort was made to remove the sawmill about twelve months since, but the boys in the company turned a good offer down and decided to keep the saw mill here. And we want to show our appreciation, and that of the business men in this city, and resent the scandalous insinuations that the Herald hurled at the boys who are giving the city a good pay roll. The article not only attempted to give the A. F. Coats Lumber Company a black eye, but it is a black eye to the city as well. If the editor of the Herald is so interested in unionizing the business houses and industries of this city, he should start in to unionize his own office and not attempt it on others.

It has been suggested that the Fourth of July would be an appropriate time to gather together all the Tillamook boys who joined the Army or Navy. This is a good idea, for it is perfectly proper to get all the boys together and show our appreciation of what they have done. We know we express the sentiment of a large number of persons in all parts of the county that an effort should be made some time this summer to have a local celebration. At first it was thought that the county fair would be a good time and place, but there are those now who think that the Fourth of July would be a more appropriate occasion. The snap shot man is not so much concerned as to the date, but we feel greatly concerned that the boys should be gotten together this year, and that we give them the time of their lives. If it is put off another year it will be much harder to get the boys together. If the date is to be the Fourth of July, a committee should be appointed as soon as possible to arrange for the biggest time ever enjoyed in Tillamook county in honoring Tillamook boys who gave their services to the government to help lick and
