### Notice of Hearing of Petition to form Drainage District. In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for The County of Tillamook.

Notice is hereby given that hearing on the following petition will be held at the Court House in the City of Tillamook, Tillamook County, State of Oregon, on the 5th day of May, 1919, for the purpose of determining whether the prayer of said petition shall be granted.

All persons owning land or claiming an interest in lands described in said petition are hereby notified to appear at said place on said date and show cause, if any there be, why the prayer in said petition should not be granted.

To the Honorable County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon:

The undersigned, being the owners of more than 50 per cent of the acreage of the contiguous body of swamp, wet and over-flow land in Tillamook County, Oregon, hereinafter described, do hereby petition your Honorable Body to cause to be organized a drainage district for the purpose of having such land reclaimed and protected from the effects of water for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and for the convenience and welfare of the public, and for the public utility and benefit, and for the purpose of this petition we state the following matters as required by Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915, as amended by Chapter 414, of the general Laws of Oregon for 1917.

I. The name proposed for such district is Stillwell Drainage District.

II. The boundary lines of the proposed district are as follows:

Beginning at the point where the quarter section line running East and West through the center of Section 26, Township 1 South, Range 10 West, W. M., intersects the East side of Tillamook river, and running thence East along said line to where said line intersects the right bank of Trask River near the center of said Section 26; thence following the right bank of Trask river up stream Southerly, Easterly and Northerly to the Northerly bank of a slough connecting said Trask River with what is known as Trask River cut-off at a point near the Northwest corner of the Southeast quarter of the Southwest quarter of Section 25, in Township 1 South of Range 10 west, W. M.; thence following the bank of said slough northeasterly to the left bank of what is known as Trask River cut-off; thence following said left bank of the Trask River cut-off Northerly to its intersection with the South or left bank of Hoquart Slough; thence down said Hoquart Slough, following the left bank thereof, to the intersection of said Hoquart Slough with the Tillamook River; thence following the right bank of Tillamook River, up stream to the place of beginning.

And all of the lands included within said boundaries constitute a contiguous body or swamp, wet and over-flow lands.

III. The total acreage included in said proposed district is 432 1/2 acres.

IV. The names of the owners of land in said proposed district as shown by the records of Tillamook County, Oregon, and the acreage owned by each of such owners is as follows:

The proposed reclamation and protection of said lands is for sanitary and agricultural purposes, and such

proposed reclamation and protection will be conducive to the public health and welfare, and of public utility, and benefit.

VI. All of the lands included in said proposed district are properly included therein, and will be beneficially affected by the operations of the proposed district.

VII. The benefits of such proposed reclamation and protection will exceed the damage to be done, and the best interests of the land included and of the owners of such land as a whole, and of the public at large, will be promoted by the formation and proposed operations of such district.

VIII. The formation of a drainage district under the provisions of Chapter 340 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1915, as amended by Chapter 414 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1917, under the provisions of which this organization is proposed, is a proper and advantageous method of accomplishing the reclamation and protection of the lands included in said proposed drainage district.

IX. The proposed plan for reclamation and protection of the property in the proposed drainage district is, that a dike or embankment shall be constructed around the outer boundary of said district, of sufficient height to protect said lands from over-flow from the waters of the adjoining rivers and sloughs, with tide-gates therein at such places as may be found necessary for the purpose of affording the necessary drainage of water from the lands in such district. The lands included in the district are all subject to over-flow, and are cut up to a considerable extent by tidal sloughs, and it is proposed to drain said lands and provide for keeping the waters drained off of the land so that instead of the land remaining cold and wet as they do under present conditions, the water will be drained off and the land will dry off more quickly, and be thereby rendered more fit for cultivation and more productive.

X. In carrying out the plan of reclamation it is proposed to make use of some diking work already done by some of the owners, and also to act in connection with Tillamook County in raising the road bed of the county road which runs along a portion of the boundary of the district.

XI. The signers of this petition agree that they will pay any and all expenses incurred, and any tax or taxes that may be levied against their respective lands for the purpose of paying the expense of organizing, or attempting to organize the proposed district, the expense to be taxed against the land of the signers in proportion to the number of acres owned by them and affected by the proposed project.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that the lands described herein, or such of them as may be found by the court to be properly included in the proposed district, either permanently or until further investigation and survey may permit elimination, shall be declared organized into a drainage district under the provisions of the Laws of Oregon relating to such districts and hereinbefore referred to.

### Membership Drive for Oregon State Chamber of Commerce.

A membership drive for the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce has been launched by John L. Etheridge, of Portland, state chairman of the membership committee.

During the past month an office force working overtime, has been perfecting the committees organization for securing members for the new chamber. A large room has been set aside specially for this purpose by Mr. Etheridge, Manager and Vice-president, Morris Bros., Inc., Bond House, in the Morris Building, 309 Stark Street, Portland.

The aim is to secure individual membership from the representative citizens of every town, community and rural district of Oregon, and organization memberships from every local, commercial or development body.

F. C. Baker, of Tillamook, has been appointed Chairman Membership Committee for Tillamook County. Also the following of Tillamook county have been appointed chairmen of the Membership Committee for their respective cities: F. C. Baker, Tillamook; John Nelson, Bay City; W. B. Harris, Bar View; C. W. Ross, Rockaway; W. High, Cloverdale; H. E. Rinehart, Wheeler; Thos. B. Watt, Brighton; B. J. Cooper, Mohler; U. S. Bryant, Nehalem.

"Every citizen who has anything at stake in the State of Oregon, or who has an interest in the progress and development of his own section, or of the State as a whole, will be interested in the State Chamber of Commerce," said Chairman Etheridge. "Every organization whose purpose it is to advance the development of its local community or of the entire state should be affiliated. The State Chamber of Commerce is laid out on the broadest lines. Its organization plan is so safeguarded that no one section of Oregon, not even the metropolis, can control it. Portland has a representative of only two members on the board of fifteen directors, the other thirteen members of the board residing out in the state."

"Eastern Oregon is represented by six directors, residing in different sections of that great region, the development of which contributes so heavily to the taxable wealth and commercial prosperity of the state. Seven directors reside in different parts of Western Oregon, including representation from the Rogue River Valley, the Coos Bay country, the port region at the mouth of the Columbia River and the East and West sides, as well as the northern and southern ends of the Willamette Valley.

"Such a representation precludes the possibility of the state organization being used selfishly to promote the interests of the metropolis or of any other one section as against the interests of any other section or of the state as a whole.

"Industrially, the diversified interests of the state are also represented. Livestock, agriculture, fruit, timber, manufacturing, merchandising and foreign commerce are all represented on the board.

"Such an organization can be made a gigantic power for the material progress of Oregon. Its work is needed. The success of its mission depends primarily upon the character, number and geographical distribution of its members.

There are three classes of memberships: First, "Commercial" comprising local Chamber of Commerce and Commercial Clubs; 2nd, "Association," being associations organized for promoting any industrial, agricultural or other industries and not organized for private purposes; and finally, the "Individual," non-voting Memberships. The annual fee for the "Commercial" membership is \$10.00 for each 100 members and \$10.00 additional for each additional major fraction thereof. The fee for "Association" Membership is \$20.00 per year. An annual minimum fee of \$5 is to be paid by the "Individual" non voting members.

"It is difficult to see how individuals, state wide organizations or commercial bodies having any public spirit or any interest in local or state development can remain out-
