'Two Excellent Recipes in which

DOUGHNUTS

1 cup sugar, 2 1/2 tablespoons COLUMBIA BRAND OLEOMARGARINE, 3 eggs, 1 cup milk, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, flour to roll.

Cream the butter and add one-half sugar. Beat egg until light and remaining sugar, and combine mixture. Add 1/4 cup flour, mixed and sifted with baking powder, salt and spices. Turn enough more flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Toss one-third of mixture on flour board, knead slightly, pat, and roll out to 1/4-inch thickness. Shape with a doughnut cutter, fry in deep fat, take up with a fork, and drain on brown paper. Repeat this process until mixture is used.

BISCUITS

3 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon COLUMBIA BRAND OLEOMARGARINE, and 1/2 cup milk.

Mix dry ingredients. Work in oleomargarine with tip of fingers; add gradually the liquids, mixing with knife to a soft dough. Toss on a floured board, pat and roll lightly to 1/4-inch thickness. Shape with dough cutter. Place on buttered pan, and bake in hot oven. It is impossible to determine the exact amount of liquid owing to the difference in flour.
