SOME STARTLING STATEMENTS.

About the Facts and the Widespread Relationships of the Mooney Case.

Some startling statements are made concerning the Mooney case in an article by F. R. Welsh, some of which are that:
The San Francisco grand jury has investigated charges against District Attorney Fickert, made by John B. Densmore, nephew of secretary of Labor Wilson, and sent by Wilson to California, and has pronounced them false. Densmore was a known Mooney sympathizer when sent to California by the national administration. Densmore fled the state to avoid testifying before the grand jury which investigated his charges.
Mooney was a professional anarchist, who helped to found and support two anarchist papers, the Revolt and the Blast. He was a friend of Trotsky. Lenin was a contributor to the Revolt. Mooney founded a left wing socialist school for the instruction of children, in which his wife was a teacher. Beckman and Haywood were contributors to the Blast; both are sentenced for sedition.
Mooney was a member of the I. W. W. and the Syndicalist League, a German Socialist organization. He preached anarchy, revolution and the overthrow of government.
Mooney was one of the agitators for the pardon of the McNamoras until they confessed the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building and the consequent killing of a score of working people. He was a friend of Hillstrom, the I. W. W., who was executed for the killing of a grocer and his son while he was trying to rob their little store. President Wilson intervened with Governor Spry in Hillstrom's behalf. Mooney wrote letters threatening the assassination of Governor Spry if he did not pardon murderer Hillstrom and to Governor Johnson, of California, if he did not pardon Ford and Sohr, who killed a district attorney and deputy sheriff. During the fight to induce Governor Stephens, of California, to pardon Mooney, he received many letters threatening his life, and his home in Sacramento was dynamited.
Two I. W. W.'s arrested in San Francisco confessed that Mooney was one of their two paymasters. In their custody was found a quantity of bombs, phosphorus to be used in destroying crops and barns and starting forest fires and anthrax germs for infecting and killing cattle. Johannsen, named as the other paymaster by these I. W. W.'s, has been touring the country making Mooney speeches. He is under indictment for dynamiting and was a delegate to attend the trial of Haywood and the other I. W. W.'s in Chicago on behalf of the Reds in San Francisco. While attending the Haywood trial, Secretary of Labor Wilson appointed Johannsen United States mediator of munitions strikes.
Frank P. Walsh, member of the War Labor board until recently, is mentioned in the correspondence of Berkman and other Pacific coast anarchists as the Washington influence upon whom they must depend to get themselves out of trouble. George P. West, United States investigator under Walsh, wrote a letter to Berkman, found among that anarchist assassin's papers, in which West told of what he had done to change the sentiment of laboring men in behalf of Mooney and furnished Berkman an advance copy of his official re-

port in behalf of Mooney which was issued just before the Mooney trial.
The report of the Mooney Mediation Commission sent out by Secretary of Labor Wilson is said to have been written by G. S. Arnold, son-in-law of ex-Congressman Kent, of California, member of the U. S. Trade Commission. Arnold contributed \$500 to the Haywood defense fund; he holds a federal position as an investigator of the Department of Labor.
Robert Minor, who had been editor of two anarchist publications, and was associated with the Mooney movement, was denied a passport by the U. S. State department upon the recommendation of agents of the Department of Justice, on the same grounds upon which I. W. W.'s and anarchists in general are being deported from the United States, but later was appointed by George Creel as an official representative of the United States government in Russia.
When Miss Theodora Pollock, leader of the I. W. W. on the Pacific coast was arrested with other I. W. W.'s charged with many crimes, a letter of hers was found in which she stated that George Creel assured her that Frank P. Walsh was in sympathy with the I. W. W. Ex-Congressman Keitt, a member of President Wilson's Tariff Commission, used his influence to shield Miss Pollock.
J. Edward Morgan, who was so roughly handled by soldiers who attacked a Mooney parade carrying red flags in New York city, that he had to go to a hospital, is the same man who, upon being arrested in California, was found to have a letter from Secretary Tumulty in his possession.
Lieut. Commander Van Tintwerp, of the Naval Intelligence office of the United States Navy, resigned when he was called to Washington and rebuked because he had made statements disagreeable to the Department of Labor relative to certain bomb explosions coincident with labor disturbances in the Mare Island navy yard.

Simon Lubin, of Sacramento, head of the Immigration and Housing Commission, appointed members of the I. W. W. to investigate crimes of arson alleged to have been committed by members of the I. W. W. against the Redwood Lumber Company in an effort to destroy war material. Lubin was referred to in I. W. W. correspondence as "our trusted friend."
Judge Franklin Griffin, trial judge in the Mooney case, whose statements have been quoted in connection with the Mooney verdict, is a Sinn Feiner, who publicly expressed his sympathy with Sir Roger Casement. The jury which convicted Mooney was unanimous in its verdict. It comprised two union labor men. The foreman of the jury has stated that the testimony of Oxman, whom subsequent events have discredited, was not determinative, but that there was a great mass of other evidence against Mooney. The friends of Mooney, comprising many powerful individuals and organizations, have spent millions in defending him, but have not developed any plausible theory as to who else committed the crime for which Mooney was convicted. Governor Stephens was re-elected governor after refusing to pardon Mooney and Fickert was re-elected prosecuting attorney by a large plurality after having convicted him.

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JURY FINDS FULLERTON LIBELED THE UNIVERSITY

Convicted Published Obscene Matter Without Evidence About a Clean Institution.

That it is a crime under the laws of Oregon to defend the character of an institution of learning and its students was demonstrated in the circuit court at Eugene last week when James Fullerton was convicted of publishing a pamphlet called the "Hornet" which asserted that "immorality was rife" at the University of Oregon.
Mr. Fullerton was sentenced Saturday to one year in jail, at least 30 days of which must be served.
About fifty witnesses were placed on the stand, and the state undertook to prove not only that the charges were untrue and lacked any possible foundation, but that the University was in a position to know at all times the circumstances surrounding all its students, and that the exceptionally clean and wholesome atmosphere existed.
The defendant was allowed without objection from the state, to recite to the jury everything he had ever heard or suspected about the University, its president or its students. Not only did he fail to adduce evidence that immorality existed, but the University took the stand and laid before the jury its entire disciplinary history since 1872, including cases that Fullerton never heard of. In all that time not a single University woman had ever gone to the bad, according to the evidence, and cases of discipline among the men students had been astonishingly few.
In the recent army examinations, which every male student had to undergo, the army authorities reported that there was, on the microscopic

test, not a single case of venereal disease, and through the whole term of the war not a single request for prophylactic treatment.

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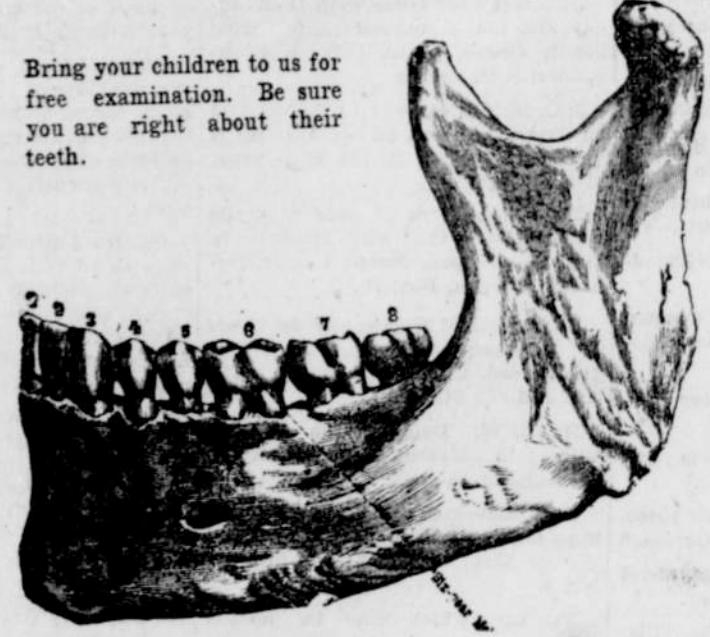
