America is now going to try to clothe the destitute refugee, not only of Northern France and Belgium but of the whole allied world. Through the American Red Cross, America is being asked to contribute 10,000 tons of used clothing, shoes, for all ages and both sexes; piece goods, ticking, sheeting, blankets and woollens, light cotton flannels to make garments for newborn babes and anything in the line of clothing that will keep the spark of life aglow. A great drive for this clothing is to be held in the nation March 24-29, but because of other conflicting drives, the Portland chapter, American

Red Cross, in which Tillamook county is, has set the drive for April 7 to 13 inclusive.
