

HIGHWAY CAMPAIGN LOOMS

Public Approval of Roosevelt Bond Issue Object.

To organize for a campaign to insure public approval of a \$2,500,000 bond issue for the Roosevelt highway a meeting will be held at the Imperial hotel in Portland on Friday. There will be delegates from Lane, Douglas, Lincoln, Curry Coos and Tillamook counties.

B. F. Jones, representative for Lincoln county, introduced and secured the passage of the measure for the Roosevelt highway. It calls for a bond issue to be matched by the government for a coastal road. If the people adopt the measure at the special election June 3, and the government fails to match the appropriation, then the state bonds will not have to be issued. Assurances have been received, it is said, that the government will co-operate.

Mr. Jones is now in Portland ready to confer with the delegates from the various counties on the coast when they arrive. The commercial club of Eugene is selecting three representatives. Tillamook county will be represented by State Senator T. B. Handley, H. H. Rosenberg, G. W. Dwight and W. J. Riechers.

DESERT LIFE HAS INTENSE APPEAL FOR MR. FAIRBANKS.

Star of "Bound in Morocco" Has Interesting Experiences on Location. Desert life always has appealed to Douglas Fairbanks and he therefore enjoyed the making of the outdoor scenes of "Bound in Morocco" his latest Artcraft production, which presumably are laid on the Sahara desert. When he returned from two weeks of location work he was tanned and told many stories of his interesting experiences during that time.

Rough on Moonshiners.

Moonshiners in Tillamook County have rough sledding, especially as the federal government is now taking them in hand as well as the county. Leo Sebastino, a Dago, is the last to be caught. Sheriff Campbell and Deputy Sheriff F. McKinley raided Sebastino's scow at Wheeler, near the box factory, last week, where they found five gallons of moonshine and 30 gallons of mash, arresting Sebastino and placed him in the jail at Wheeler. Immediately after he broke jail by prying three bars out of the window. Deputy Sheriff Frank Reed was detailed to trail the escaped prisoner alone and started on his trail about 10 hours after Leo's escape. Frank took Leo's dog, which had followed his master for a short distance, but had been driven back by him, and started on Leo's trail. He traveled from 1 until 5 p.m., traveling about nine miles through very rough and brushy country, part of the time traveling in three inches of snow and in a general direction towards Miami. The dog broke his leash at 5 p.m. and as it was getting dark Frank walked about a mile and a half to Barnesdale and came home in an auto.

Sebastino is out on parole from the state penitentiary, where he was serving a sentence for man-slaughter. He is 35 years of age, an Italian and uneducated.

He faces federal and state charges for "moonshining" with a maximum fine of \$1,250.00 and 18 months in jail, a charge of jail breaking and his unexpired sentence at the state prison.

Sebastino, after wandering in the mountains for 36 hours finally made his way to the mouth of the Miami and then walked up that stream about nine miles to the home of Mr. Morrison, where he asked for food and shelter. He was chilled, hungry and exhausted. M. J. Maddox picked him up and started towards Wheeler but met Deputy Sheriff Frank C. Reed on the road, and turned the prisoner over to Frank who brought him to Tillamook.

He pleaded guilty to the charges of violating the prohibition law and was fined \$200.00. He gave Sheriff Campbell power of attorney to sell some personal property, which will cover the fine. Federal authorities took him in charge and took him to Portland, where, no doubt, he will get a severe sentence.

Albers Sentenced To Serve 3 Years.

Three years in prison and a \$10,000 fine were included in the sentence imposed on Henry Albers by Judge Wolverton Monday for violation of the espionage act. Before passing sentence, Judge Wolverton denied the motion for a new trial, argued by Henry E. McGinn and John McCourt counsel for Albers.
