

Job of Spending Gigantic Appropriations Too Big for the Spenders.

The 65th congress just closed made such lavish appropriations during and after the war that the job of spending the nearly 80 billions appropriated was too big for the spenders. Consequently about 20 billions will be saved. The ultimate cost of the war will be about 60 billions. These figures are based on an estimate made in Washington.

No true American begrudged the amplest expenditures for the war—we had pledged our all if need be—but dumping our resources in a heap and "going it blind" is not to make efficient use of them. Yet, with the war at an end, no enemy in sight, and the nations discussing peace and reduction of armament, this prodigal administration is urging the appropriation of nearly 2 billion dollars for a standing army, and a record-breaking big naval program, the biggest naval program in history.

The symbolic device on the seal of the United States Treasury should be a sieve. The great pity is that the millions and billions which now pass through the great vacuum at Washington must be dug out of the earth by our workers and producers and then taken from the earnings of the common people and the pockets of the great consuming class, while at their source they represent natural wealth which can never be re-created for us.

Income Taxes.

One-fifth of every American's income will be taken away from us this year for taxes direct and indirect. This is the result of the world's greatest financial drunk which has been going on for months at Washington. No orgy of spending in all history compares with it. One-tenth of this country's estimated wealth has been appropriated at a single term of congress. On top of this with a 7 billion issue of Victory Loan notes coming in April—the Treasury meanwhile borrowing money from the banks to meet running expenses, with the war an event of the past, this Congress O. K.'s though it did not reach and pass an appropriation of 720 million dollars for the navy, the greatest naval appropriation bill in the history of the world; provides for spending 1,070 million dollars on the regular army; and then, like a drunken sailor strewing the street with his pay, throws away nearly 100 million in "small change" on public building and river and harbor "pork". An appropriation for the federal employment service, which might have been the means of saving us from something worse than a war in Europe—bolshevism in America, for instance—was ruled out of order!

The drunken sailor even then, has the best of it over this spendthrift administration, for it is his own money he is throwing away, not millions and billions for which he is trustee, and his largeness of view, recklessness of consequence and princely contempt for money or its uses born of an alcohol-crazed brain. But no drunken sailor, however prodigal, has ever flung money broadcast with the reckless abandon with which billions have been and are still being spent by the present trustees of the nation.

Dollar Haters.

Americans often are accused of being dollar worshipers but their administration at Washington appear to hate the sight of money judging from the manner with which they throw it away and try to get rid of it.

It is due to this riot of indiscriminate and unexampled spending that the American people at the present time are the most heavily taxed nation on the globe.

The Treasurer of the United States estimates that it will cost the American tax payers 1,200 million dollars a year for the next quarter of a century to pay off our net war debt, less the amounts lent to the allies.

This means we must be taxed every year for 25 years to raise 765 million dollars annual interest to be paid to bond holders. Also for the additional 417 millions a year to go into a sinking fund in order to pay off the principal.

In other words, to lift this debt on the installment plan—and we now can lift it in no other way—we must pay 80 billions of dollars to square a debt of 18 billion dollars.

It is estimated that our total expenditures for the war itself will aggregate 30 billions, or 10 billions more than the combined resources of the 12 Federal Reserve Banks.

For a standing army of 175,000 men \$1,070,000,000 would have been appropriated had congress been able to reach the bill. That ought to give us an army of 175,000 major generals instead of soldiers.

No country in the world ever spent so much money on its military arm in time of peace as these appropriations for our army and navy. The naval appropriation alone exceeds the combined annual naval budgets of the world's three greatest maritime powers preceding the war. Added to this, 626 millions more are appropriated and turned over to the shipping board and the Emergency Fleet Corporation and others.

The new warships will be obsolete before there can be another great war. They will be rotting hulks long before half our war debt can be paid. In my humble judgment we are in much more danger of going into national bankruptcy than of going to war between now and the time this dearly bought war junk would have to be sent to the scrap heap even if the world fails to achieve a permanent peace.

One of the first things the new Congress should do is to establish a budget for the government. They reduce expenses. They cut graft and "pork" to the minimum. Here is a reform that is compulsory.

Another California World's Record Cow.

There are only six cows in the world that have produced over 30,000 lbs. milk each in one year, and only one cow that has exceeded this amount on two different occasions. All these animals have been of the Holstein-Friesian breed. In two cases these big yearly records have been made under strictly official test; which means that the animal is constantly under the observation of a supervisor, appointed by the state college of agriculture, or other state agency having control of cow testing. At each milking the supervisor is present; sees the milk weighed, and takes a sample which he forwards, together with his report, to the state college of agriculture.

Within the past few weeks a large number of new records made by Holstein cows in America have been reported and the most recent one comes from California, where Raphaela Johanna Aaggie 3rd 185125, a 7-year-old cow owned by Napa State Hospital, Cal., has annexed the world's championship for a year's milk production under strictly official test. Her milk record for 365 days is 30,461.2 lbs. (1,033 lbs. butter) and she displaces Zarilda Clothilde 3d De Kol 133840, the British Columbia Holstein, whose strictly official figures for one year are 30,427 lbs. milk, (1,070.22 lbs. butter). In establishing this yearly record Raphaela Johanna Aaggie 3d also made a 7-day, 30-day and 60-

day milk record for a United States cow.

For seven days she is credited with 910.8 lbs. 30 days, 3,785.1 lbs., and for 60 days, 6,876.7 lbs. milk. Raphaela Johanna Aaggie 3d received practically the same feed as the rest of the cows in the Papa Hospital herd. She was allowed to roam the alfalfa fields during a portion of each day. For each pound of grain she consumed a return of 5 1/2 lbs. of milk was given, and she gained 300 lbs. during the test, turning the scale at 1,661.5 lbs. at the end of the year.

The sire of Raphaela Johanna Aaggie 3d is King Pontiac Hengerveld 52297 (24 A. R. O. daughters and four proven sons), a son of the only double century sire, King of the Pontiacs, and out of an A. R. O. daughter of the first century sire, Heigerveld De Kol. Her dam is Raphaela Johanna Aaggie 74216, an A. R. O. cow with four A. R. O. daughters to her credit.

Raphaela Johanna Aaggie 3rd is due to calve from service by King Morocco Alcartra, a son of that wonderful producer, Tilly Alcartra, whose extraordinary records for milk and butter production (156,776 lbs. milk, 6,141 lbs. butter in six years) have earned for her the undisputed title of Queen of the Dairy World. "Raphaela" was bred by T. A. Page, of West Edmeston, N. Y., and was later owned by John L. Smith, of Spokane, Wash., from whom she was purchased in 1917 by Business Manager Owen Duffy, for the Napa State Hospital.
