Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Tillamook County, will receive proposals until 10 a.m. April 19, 1919, for the construction of a plank road approximately 16000 feet in length, from the west end of the macadam on the Wheeler-Brighton county road in Sec. 3. Tp. 2 N., R. 10 W., W. M. to the postoffice at Brighton.  
Plank to be 3 inches thick, not less than 8 inches in width and 10 feet long, fastened with 6 6-inch spikes to 3, 3x6 stringers, plank to be 3/4 inches apart.  
Suitable turnouts shall be constructed at points and in such manner as may be designated by the County Court.  
All material to be furnished by the contractor, the lumber to be No. 1 common fir. Work to begin one week after contract is let and to be completed within 60 days.  
Bidders are required to submit bids at a unit price per M ft. of lumber and shall accompany same with cash, certified cheque, or bidders bond equal in amount to 5 percent to be made payable to Tillamook County.  
Permission will be given the contractor to close the road during improvement of same. The County Court reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

Local Teachers' Institute.  
A local Teachers' Institute of Tillamook County was held at the High School Building last Saturday.  
The meeting was called to order by President O. V. White, Supt. of the Tillamook schools.  
Mrs. Blanch Blumauer, Secretary of the Portland Chapter of the Junior Red Cross, was then introduced and gave a very able address on the work the organization is doing at this time.  
Mrs. Sadie Dunbar, of Portland, Secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, followed Mrs. Blumauer with an excellent talk on the Modern Health Crusade work which is now being carried on in most of the counties of the state. This work is of vital importance to every child in the public schools and the speakers were very desirous that the teachers of this county take up the work and push it, even though the school terms are nearing the end. After the plan of the work had been explained the teachers unanimously agreed to cooperate with the Portland offices in the furtherance of the work.  
The teachers then adjourned to the domestic science room of the High School, where a fine luncheon was served by the students of that department, ably directed by Miss Maude Skidmore, instructor.  
First on the program in the afternoon was Prof. E. K. Barnes, of the Union High School, at Nehalem, who read a very ably prepared paper on the subject "What Next." The talk was patriotic in its nature, and a high tribute was paid the teacher and his work. H. S. Brimhall, principal of the Nehalem Public School, next addressed the teachers on the subject of "Discipline in the Public School." He was followed by Prof. J. R. Bidgood, of the Cloverdale High School, who gave an interesting talk on "Vocational Education." Mrs. C. J. Edwards, president of the Red Cross work in Tillamook County, gave an excellent address on the work of that noble organization.  
"Although the war is over, and there is still much work to be done," said the speaker. Her address was inspiring to all present.  
The teachers went on record as favoring the health program, the Red Cross Work, the securing of a health nurse for Tillamook County, whose duties would be to cooperate with the teachers in carrying on the work of the Health Program.  
On motion of Prof. Barnes, a committee composed of Supt. Geo. Lamb, Prof. White, and ex-supt. Buell, was appointed to cooperate with the county court in the matter of securing a health nurse for this county.  
Thirty six teachers were in attendance. The weather was ideal, and the interest good.  
The meeting adjourned to meet at Nehalem some time in April, at the call of the president.
