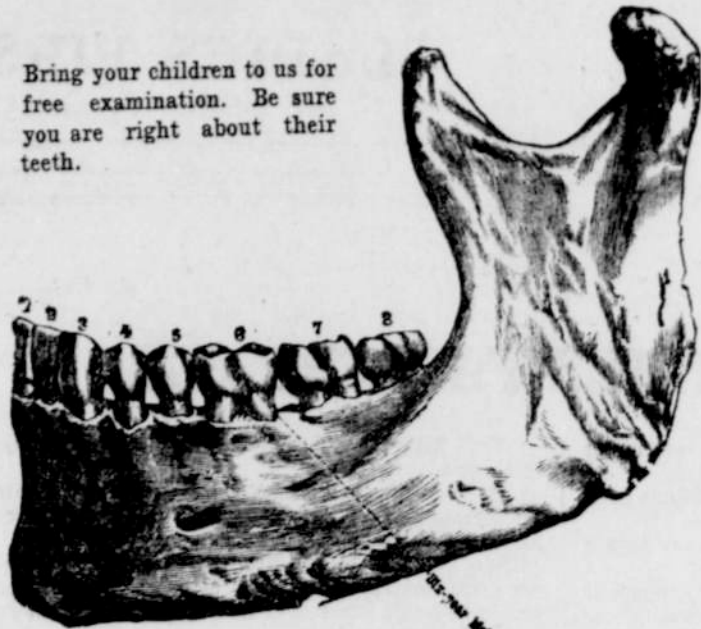

The dentist has a duty as a teacher as well as an operator—to give instruction in the use of the brush, the toothpick, silk floss, etc. Only about 14 per cent of the people of America make any intelligent use of dentistry.

1—The mouth is a gateway of health and disease
2—Hard foods, if well masticated, help to make and keep good teeth. The cleaning power of vigorous mastication is greater and better than artificial cleaning.

3—Soft foods cling to the teeth; hard foods clean them.

4—A clean mouth helps to make a sweet breath.

5—Food left on teeth brings decay. Clean teeth seldom decay.

6—Decay commences on the outside of teeth. Unclean teeth decay chiefly at night. Clean the teeth before going to bed. Clean the teeth again in the morning.

7—Wash the mouth after every meal.

8—Brush all the teeth thoroughly, especially the back teeth, on all surfaces.

9—The medicament used, whether a dentifrice or soap and water, is not so important as the

method of using. Avoid, however, any mixture that contains grit.

10—When cleaning the teeth the greatest care should be bestowed upon the removal of food and debris from between the teeth, using a brush with bristles to conform to and reach the spaces. An excellent adjunct and a great protection against decay consists in passing silk between all the teeth and drawing it outward in such a manner as not to hurt the gum.

11—In use the brush should not be allowed to pass to and fro from the front to the back teeth only; but with a short pressing sweep from the gums to the cutting edge of the teeth. Thus the stroke in the upper jaw is from the gum downward, while in the lower jaw it is from the gum upward.

12—The force used in chewing food is modified (1) by the use made habitually of the teeth, (2) by the loss of the pulp, (3) by disease of the periodontal membranes. The strength of the teeth is ample for reasonable stress, but metals, very hard substances, and some confections should be excluded.

Saving the world for democracy is going to be a small job for Mr. Wilson compared with that of saving the democracy from extinction at the hands of the indignant American voter when he gets another opportunity to go to the polls.

The Columbia S. C. Record, says that President Taft places country above party. One can understand how strongly that must appeal to the Democratic organ of a state so consistently and persistently non-partisan as South Carolina.

The new Democratic national chairman may not be much of an organizer, and in view of the result of the last campaign, conducted under his direction, is probably not a Napoleon of politics, but at least he talks more than Colonel House ever did.

Owing to the failure of the necessary appropriations, the so-called U. S. Employment Service has been "skeletonized" by discharging all the privates in the organization and retaining all the high salaried executives on the pay roll. Isn't that characteristic?

Part of the five million appropriated for the peace conference is to be expended making life masks of the five immortals who represent the United States at Paris. It will be quite a hardship to Colonel House to keep still long enough to have his impression taken.

It will be well enough to come out of this war owing many millions of dollars without assuming other people's debts and taking on other people's troubles. Even the job of running the United States of America seems a bit too big for those who have been trying to do it.

President Wilson and his partisans keep repeating that if the United States does not go into the Cecil-Wilson league, Europe will collapse. This suggests a good advertisement for the combination: Take stock in the great world corporation. If you don't put your money in, it will bust tomorrow.

It took 40,000 more employees to run the Pennsylvania railway in 1918 than it did in 1917, with less tonnage carried. Administration democrats are still wondering how they happened to lose that last election after such a perfectly splendid arrangement had been made for something very different.

President Willys of the Willys-Overland company says: "There are 4,000,000 passenger automobiles in this country, traveling 40,000,000 miles daily, equivalent to 1600 times around the earth, and these automobiles could move 20,000,000 people one-fifth of our population—comfortably seated, 100 miles a day with one filling of gasoline."

Secretary Redfield sees nothing to criticize in the action of the British government in excluding American manufacturers from the market of the United Kingdom. The American free trader is not interested in the sale of American products abroad—what he is crazy about is promoting the sale of alien products in the United States.

The friends of the bolshevik in the United States complain because some of them have to go to jail for sedition, while the comrades in Russia whose administration they are defending, shoot the families of officers of the old Russian army who refuse to serve in the Red ranks. They ought to be thankful that they are disagreeing with an American rather than a bolshevik government, oughtn't they?

Remember that talk about abolishing all the high salaried railway jobs? The other day John Skelton Williams, who had been giving a part of his time to the post of financial expert in the railway administration, vacated the job in order to permit the director of railways to appoint a Democratic congressional lame duck to the place at a salary of \$25,000 a year. This "simplicity and economy befitting a democratic administration" will bust us yet.

National Democratic Chairman Cummings has organized himself into a National Security League and rings the welkin with the damning charge that the Republican congressmen slated for chairmanships in the next Congress voted like Kitchin and Clark did on certain war and pre-

war measures. But if Mr. Cummings was able to control himself while Kitchin and Clark were running things he ought to be able to restrain his sudden wrath about the other fellows now that the war is over.

The other day President Wilson learned that there was a civil service reform plank in the Democratic national platform of 1912 and 1916, whereupon he "fired" two members of the Civil Service Commission who had been trying to prevent Mr. Burleson from smashing all of the civil service rules, and promoted the third member, who was in for giving all the rural route jobs to deserving Democrats, to a ten thousand dollar job as a "fiscal" agent for Hayti. This finishes the job and no one can now accuse the party in power of having kept a promise or fulfilled a pledge.

A London Daily Express editorial, commenting on the Lodge resolution against the league of nations, signed by thirty-nine Republican senators, says: "These are new facts for a new world. These thirty-nine Republicans senators number five more than one third of their house. President Wilson, it is clear, has been talking very loud, very often, very eloquently for a moribund Congress and a dead public opinion. He must clear his mind on his way back to Paris. He must now talk when it is essential that he should talk at all, for the new Congress and a live public opinion, otherwise he misrepresents himself alone. As to the Monroe Doctrine, that is, of course, in direct conflict with the idea and ideals of the league of nations, and there, for the moment, we leave them both."

They Prefer White Huns to U. S. Negro Troops.

A Georgia subscriber sends to the National Republican a copy of the Times-Journal, of Eastman, Ga., containing a dispatch from Cordele, Ga., dated February 24th, which states a transient picture seller was nearly lynched at Cordele when he was discovered selling a picture in which a negro American soldier with drawn bayonet had at his feet a German soldier pleading for mercy.

Angered citizens claimed they were enraged because the picture showed a white man at the mercy of a negro. The salesman was arrested for operating without a license. He was acquitted with instructions to cease selling the picture. This he did, but a crowd pursued him and Sheriff Ward had to be summoned to protect him.

It seems from this episode that if the citizens of Cordele, Ga., had been on the western battle front during the recent hostilities, they would have felt called upon to pitch in and protect the German troops attacked by American negro regiments. Taken in connection with the fact that the federal draft administration had to interfere in Georgia to prevent conscription boards, in some instances, for finding all the white regiments physically unfit for service in order that their places in the army might be filled by negroes, this episode is an interesting episode in the great drama of saving the world for democracy.

Using Public Money For Personal And Party Ends.

Perhaps the most grossly partisan law even enacted by a state legislature was that enacted by the directors of the Non-Partisan party caucus by the North Dakota legislature providing for the withdrawal of all legal printing from every newspaper in the state not of the persuasion of the party in power. This law provides for the concentration of all legal printing, public and private, in one newspaper in each county to be politically designated. It has been estimated that the amount of printing thus provided for the maintenance of Non-Partisan organs will average six thousand dollars per year per county. It will come out of the pockets of the people of all political parties, but it will be used to build up papers engaged in promoting a cause of the party and politicians in power many of the paper being owned by the organization in office. Heretofore, under the liberal legislation of the Republican party, every paper in the state, regardless of politics, fulfilling certain qualifications, was eligible to a share of the legal printing. Under this law, however, this public printing is made partisan and personal spoils.

Another law, similarly inspired, provides an appropriation of two hundred thousand dollars a year to be used in propaganda in behalf of the present state administration, legislative and administrative, in North Dakota, justified on the ground that it is intended to promote immigration. Defense of the administration, of course, involves defense of the policies espoused by the party in power in North Dakota, and the measure simply means that all the people of the state, no matter to what party they belong, are to be taxed to pay the campaign bills of the party in power. No political party in this country ever before undertook to use the public treasury for such a purpose, if we except the publicity activities of the present national administration, which have at least hugged the border line of partisan propaganda paid for by public funds.
