

Jesse C. Remick Dies Suddenly.

A telegram from Portland on Monday brought the sad news that Jesse C. Remick, of the Cummings-Moberly Lumber Co., had been found dead in bed that morning, at his home in that city, the cause of death being attributed to the auto accident which the deceased met with a few weeks ago, when his auto left the road and went down the side of the hill at Hobsonville about 50 feet. It was first reported that Mr. Remick was seriously injured, but it was stated later he was only slightly injured. The deceased came to Tillamook from New Orleans last July, and commenced the erection of a large saw mill at Garibaldi, which was almost completed and it was expected that the mill would be tried out this week. He left Garibaldi last Friday for Portland. He was a heavy stockholder in the Cummings-Moberly Company. The deceased made many friends amongst Tillamook people, and his death is deplored. The deceased is survived by his widow, Mrs. Edna W. Remick and two daughters, Misses Frances and Martha Remick. He was 46 years of age at the time of his death.

The funeral services were held on Tuesday at the family residence, conducted by Dr. A. A. Morrison, of the Episcopal Church. An escort of Knight Templars accompanied the body from the home to the Portland crematorium, where the lodge of which the deceased was a member conducted the services.

Work at the saw mill at Garibaldi was suspended on Monday and Tuesday.

Death of Rev. Basil Schieber.

The people of Tillamook county were grieved to hear that Rev. Basil Schieber, pastor of the Sacred Heart Church in this city, was another victim of the flu, followed by pneumonia. The rev. gentleman had been sick all last week, and he grew worse passing away on Saturday evening. He was generally liked in the county, especially by members of the Catholic Church, who have lost a good pastor and spiritual adviser.

Rev. Basil Schieber, O. S. B., pastor of Sacred Heart church at Tillamook was born at Conception, Mo., 33 years ago. Father Basil came west in 1904 and entered the Benedictine order at Mount Angel. During his four years' presidency of Mount Angel college he distinguished himself as a successful educator, and in this office became widely known throughout the state. His last charge the pastorate of Tillamook county, was assigned him in June of 1917. The deceased is survived by his parents, a brother in the priesthood, Rev. Odilo, O. S. B.; three other brothers and four sisters. Interment was at St. Benedict's abbey, Mount Angel, Wednesday morning.

Pioneer Passes Away.

M. B. Petteys, formerly of Bay City, passed away at the home of his son, Walter, at Jennings Lodge, Oregon, on the third instant.

He came to Oregon in 1854 from Michigan, where he was born in 1841. He settled first near Salem, Oregon, moving to what is known as Morrow county, in 1870, thence to Tillamook in 1886, where he lived until December 1918, when he moved to Portland, Oregon.

On March 14, 1877, he was married to Sarah E. Morris, in Morrow Coun-

ty. Five children were born to them. He is survived by his wife, two sons, William A., of Portland, Oregon; Walter M., of Jennings Lodge, and daughter Allie R. Grout, of Portland; and six grandchildren.

Previous to his interment by the Bay City Masonic Lodge in the I. O. O. F. cemetery near Bay City, services were held in Portland. All the immediate members of the family were present at both ceremonies.

The following tribute was written by one of his sons of his father:

Since the grey mists of the dawn of time humanity has proven its greatness in the change, mysterious, uninvited, called death. When the shutters are drawn we are reminded of the things life offers in abundance—love, honor, virtue, usefulness. Mankind is tried in the mid-day glare of adversity, in which crucible your noble nature has been purified and exalted.

A most glorious life to look back upon is one of service. Yours was given in the interest of others, laboring through your four score of years bare-handed for the wherewithal to give support and comforts to those whom you loved.

No single item of honesty was too small for your accounting; no act of kindness escaped your tender solicitude; no feeling of sympathy was stifled in your breast; no measure of love was withheld from the deserving; no act of service however exacting was ever avoided; no unkind words were ever permitted utterance; no feeling or action of revenge could ever be attributed to you, rather, love and good-will.

Imbibing the spirit of the pioneer your lot was cast with the makers of Western history, by braving the hardships of the plains with oxen instead of locomotives; Indian trails for highways; the savage warwhoop for a welcome; and the journey's end a home to carve from virgin domains, untamed and unscarred.

Your life has thus by love, been guided to a ripened termination, to the innermost recesses of our hearts.

Father, we love you, we cherish your memory, and we shall ever keep our virtue and our integrity unshaken as your example has taught us to do.

Advertising and Right Selling Making Tillamook Famous.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Tillamook County Creamery Association, which met Monday last, it was decided to continue the advertising of the famous Tillamook Cheese on a bigger scale than ever before.

It was brought out at the meeting that trade marking the name Tillamook on the rind and advertising the quality of the cheese to the consumer, backed up, of course, by its wonderful quality, was establishing and holding a price for our product that led the markets of the United States. Ben Kuppenbender, president of the Association, who led the discussion in favor of maintaining the lead, brought out the facts that in every market where it was distributed, Tillamook attained from 2 cents to 6 cents per pound more than any other variety. Mr. Bell, of Beaver, said the question was one of simple arithmetic, that it appeared to him that all the advertising committee asked for was 3-10 of a cent per pound for advertising and that last year the advertising brought an average of 5 cents per pound, therefore the assessment of 3-10 of a cent was an investment that brought returns of 4-7-10 to the producers.

Carl Haberlach, secretary and sales manager, quoted concrete instances of how Tillamook had held the lead in price and read telegrams from the Los Angeles market, in which they sent orders for 240 boxes of Tillamook by wire on Monday at 34 cents per pound, with Wisconsin cheese quoted at 29 cents, a difference of 5 cents per pound. This order came in during the meeting and after a letter of complaint from Los Angeles in which it was stated that they could not handle any more cheese at that price.

W. Botsford, of Portland, and Mr. Constantine, of Seattle, members of the advertising firm who are responsible for the Tillamook cheese advertising, spoke at some length on the subject of advertising and exhibited drawings and other advertising matter to be used during the coming year to advocate Tillamook cheese. In addition to using newspaper space in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland, Seattle and San Diego, the advertising will consist of billboards electrically lighted in the leading cities of the Pacific Coast.

Death of Leslie G. Finney.

Leslie George Finney died on Sunday after a lingering illness of four months and 17 days. He had an attack of the flu last year, and grew gradually worse until death came. Funeral services were conducted at the grave, conducted by Rev. Harry E. Tucker, minister of the Christian Church. Deceased was born September 23, 1892, at Jamestown, Cloud County, Missouri. He moved to Clay county, Missouri, with his parents, and after the death of his parents he came to Oregon, making his home with his grandfather, Mr. Eichenger. He was married to Miss Mildred Hadley on the 23rd of September, 1917.
