

Resolution by County Court to Condemn Land for State Highway.

At a recent meeting of the County Court, the matter of the condemnation and appropriation of the lands of various persons along the line of the Coast Highway survey, made by authority of the State Highway Commission for a state highway and a county road between Tillamook City and Hebo, came up for hearing. The court found that in order to locate, establish and construct this highway that it required the condemnation and appropriation of various tracts of land, it was decided to condemn and appropriate the same. The highway in question will go through the lands of Sandusky Wilson and Anna Wilson, Besse E. Mills and Desha Mills, F. W. Robitich, Isaac H. Moore, Hope B. Moore, Margaret J. Moore, Ernest Franklin and Esther A. V. Franklin and Elmer D. Hall.

The County Court also passed a resolution declaring its intention to condemn certain property for the construction of a state highway and county road, sixty feet in width, beginning at a point on the paved county road leading from Tillamook City to Bay City, 1550 feet east and 120 feet south 34 degrees, 42 degrees east from the quarter section corner on the line between sections 13 and 14, in township 1 south of range 10 west, and running thence in a northwesterly direction to the south end of the span of the bridge across the Miami river, on the county road, in lot 5, township 1 north of range 10, the date set for hearing being the 12th of May at ten o'clock.

Obituary of Leslie G. Finney.

Leslie George Finney was born in Jamestown, Missouri, Sept. 17th, 1893, and died in Tillamook, Oregon, April 6, 1919, having reached the age of 25 years, 6 months and 20 days.

His parents died when he was but a child of 7 years. He and his brother Theodore were then brought to the Western Coast by a kind hand their grandfather, with whom they made their home for many years. Theodore died at Pasadena, Cal., 4 1/2 years ago, and Leslie struggled on alone ambitiously and willingly. He left high school and moved onward a splendid boy of vitality and youth. He was married to Miss Mildred Hadley, Sept. 23, 1917, after which time they soon moved to a place east of Tillamook, where they made their home until the time of his death. He was a most loving and tender husband. During this time the happiest days of his life were spent, also the saddest. He took sick the 20th of November, 1918, and was a patient sufferer for 4 months and 17 days, after which he was rescued and saved by his Master and Protector.

He leaves a wife, a grandfather, Robt. Eichinger and a host of friends to mourn his departure and miss his kind heart and face. He was loved by all who knew him, for to know Leslie was to be his friend. May the bereaved ones find comfort in these words: "He was not taken away unrequited," for "Truly our loss is Heaven's gain."

Who do we weep for those we dearly love. When we know that they have won their heavenly home above. The dearest ones are taken, far, far away. 'Tis not so very far, 'tis reached in a single day. Everything is glory there, everything above. Everything is God's up there, and what is God's is love. He has worked and labored until his work was done. Then his Master called, he has gone and won.

Meeting of The Holstein Breeders' Association.

The meeting was called to order by President, B. A. Folks, which met at the Holstein Cheese Factory in Fairview, at 2 p.m.

The following members were present: Rupp, Folks, Peterson, Gilmore, Neilson, Bailey, Zurlflueh, Klinehan, Watson, Schild and Dolph Tinnerstet, Tillamook County Dairy Inspector, was also present and was elected an honorary member of the Association.

President Folks made a few timely remarks in the interest of all Holstein breeders who should take an interest in developing the very best in their animals, as, also, aiming for higher standards for production.

A secretary's report and reading of the minutes, together with correspondence was duly taken up and disposed of and placed on file.

While there was only a few members present much good was done in the developing of mutual interest of the breeders. All the members present were interested to the extent of discussing some important feature of the pure bred cattle industry on the part of the Holstein breeder.

A motion was made and carried that in the future meetings should be held once a month and instead of being held in the afternoon to be held in the evenings and the ladies to be invited to join in the general activities of the meetings.

The meeting of May to be called by the president, will be held at the farm of J. J. Rupp; meeting of June will be held at the farm of C. N. Gilmore.

Under discussion of meetings and invitation was entered through D. Tinnerstet to use the Grange hall at any time the Association desired. Mr.

Tinnerstet made some excellent remarks in regard to the development of the dairy industry, in a general way for the county, and that he would use every effort possible in his official capacity as County Inspector to co-operate in the fullest way possible to improve conditions where necessary to the improvement of the dairy industry as a whole throughout the County of Tillamook. His remarks met the hearty approval of the members present.

A motion was made and seconded that the \$200.00 which was set aside for prize money in connection of a purchaser of the John Hettz cattle—that this money be pro-rated to B. W. Neilson who purchased 4 head; F. J. Klinehan and L. D. Smith who purchased one head.

The matter of an exhibit of pure bred Holsteins at the coming County Fair was discussed, as well also, the matter of improvements to be taken up with the Fair Board of the cattle barn.

John Schild and C. N. Gilmore were appointed as a committee to confer with the Fair Board in regard to the time that the cattle should be on exhibition. Some of the members contended that four days was too long a time for cattle to be confined in the stalls at the fair grounds and they are to take this matter up with the Fair Board.

Members dues were paid in as shown by the treasurer's report. The meeting adjourned at the call of the President to be held in May.

W. S. Kirkpatrick, Manager of the Advertising Bureau, has received information that J. L. Etheridge, President of Morris Bros., Inc., Portland, in aid of the Victory loan has contributed to the advertising fund sufficient for one of the most distinctive paid publicity efforts ever made in any state in aid of the government. It will be launched just preceding the drive in Oregon. Every daily and weekly newspaper in Oregon will receive for simultaneous publication an advertisement almost a full page in size. This will mean 150 advertisements, 100 column inches each or 15,000 inches of advertising space at a cost of \$5,000. It is Mr. Etheridge's idea to make this appeal not only from a patriotic standpoint, but for the purpose of acquainting Oregon people with the true worth of a Government bond as a safe, sane and profitable investment. The publication date selected is April 17th. The contribution is expected to serve not only in carrying Oregon "over the top" but as a stimulus to the advertising fund in each community of the state.

Essays by the school children of Oregon on the subject of "Why a Victory Loan" should all be in the hands of the committee on or before April 16. The essays are being prepared by the children under the direction of the teachers in the grades and are transmitted through the school superintendents. The ten best essays from each county are entered in the state-wide competition. The judges who will award the prizes in the essay contest are the following: Portland educators: D. A. Grout, T. D.
