Twenty-seven banks in Oregon have bank deposits of \$1,000,000 or more, as shown by a statement issued by the state banking department, based on the report of the conditions in these 27 cities amount to \$187,680,403. Portland is at the head of the list with 22 banks, having deposits of \$124,678,494. Other cities in the list named in order are Salem, Astoria, Pendleton, Eugene, Klamath Falls, Baker, Albany, The Dalles, Oregon City, LaGrande, Corvallis, McMinnville, Hood River, Marshfield, Roseburg, Hillsboro, Silverton, Bend, Heppner, Grants Pass, Tillamook, Ontario, Ashland, and Lakeview.

The State Highway Commission let a contract for five miles of hard surfaced road in Tillamook county last week and will be a continuation of the hard surfaced road south of this city. The contractors who were awarded the work were the Warren Construction Company, for \$112,000. The county is now preparing the road bed. The new piece of road to be built at the Moore place will probably not be paved this year as it is thought it would not be in condition to be paved when finished. The State Highway Commission will not let any more contracts in Tillamook county until the special election in June, and should the county bond measure pass the county court will be in a position to co-operate with the State Highway Commission for 10 or 15 miles more of hard surfaced road, ten miles of which is proposed to build north of this city or as far as Garibaldi if possible.

Roy J. Mapes Is Drowned.

A sad and fatal accident occurred on Saturday afternoon in Hoquart slough, when Roy J. Mapes lost his life by drowning. He was working for the A. F. Coats Lumber Co., and was engaged in getting logs from the slough to the mill. When it was known that the saw mill had run out of logs, it was surmised that something might have happened to Mapes, and it proved correct, for his hat and pike pole was found near the dry kiln. Upon a search being made his body was dragged out of the slough. There was a bruise over the eye, and it is thought that the young man had slipped from a log, and had rendered him unconscious, for he was a good swimmer. Dr. Beals was called and for nearly two hours worked with the body in the hope of resuscitate it, but the body had evidently been in the water nearly one hour, for the deceased's watch had stopped at 17 minutes past three and it was five minutes past four when the body was recovered.

Roy Ivan Mapes, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Mapes was born in Tillamook, Oregon, April 23rd, 1890. Died April 19, 1919, aged 29 years. He was married to Miss Mary Lucas, Aug. 16, 1914. Two children were born to them, Ivan Ralph, who died in infancy, and Geraldine Mary, aged 18 months.

He has five brothers and one sister, Albert J. Mapes, Tillamook; Arthur L. Mapes, Echo, Ore.; Frank M. Mapes, Salem; Rodney H. Mapes, Salem, who fought with the Marines in France; Hallech H. Mapes, still in France and Mrs. Erwin Harrison. He accepted Christ when about 14 years old.

Funeral services were conducted at the cemetery by Rev. Harry E. Tucker of the Christian Church, which was attended by a large number of persons, for the unfortunate young man was greatly respected, and the bereaved wife and relatives have the sympathy of their numerous friends.

PAROLED CONVICT PLANS KIDNAPING EXPOSED

A. C. White is Sought When Alleged Associates Confess.

When three strangers appeared at the office of Sheriff Campbell at Tillamook last week and told the officer they had been lured into the county by Albert C. White, a parole violator of the Oregon State penitentiary, who promised them a rich reward if they would help him kidnap A. G. Beals, of Tillamook, and two of White's children whom Beals had adopted, it was feared that White would take extreme means to carry out grim threats, made previously and which brought upon him the sentence to the penitentiary in March 1915. As the result of the latest sensation in the case, Governor Olcott Friday, through Warden Stevens of the state prison, signed a proclamation offering a reward of \$100 for White's apprehension.

As violator of his parole from the penitentiary, White has evaded the officers for nearly nine months. A. G. Beals the object of his hatred, is a Tillamook business man and was formerly a member of the legislature. The two children are twins, a boy and a girl, 8 years old, and were adopted by Beals and his wife several years ago after White was left a widower. It is said that when White first entered into the conspiracy to kidnap the children, to which he pleaded guilty in March, 1915, he also threatened Beals' life.

According to the story of the three strangers who appeared before Sheriff Campbell last week, White had persuaded them to help him kidnap the children and also Beals himself. Their statement is that White told them there would be \$30,000 in the coupe and that after \$200 had been paid for expenses, \$28,000 would be divided among the four. White, it appears, left the other three before the plan could be carried out and they then withdrew from the conspiracy. White, it is apparent has left Tillamook county and gone to Portland, but this has not allayed the fears of Beals, who Friday called upon Governor Olcott and declared that he feared White not only would kidnap the children and hold them for ransom, but that he would attempt personal injury to Beals.

Beals claims that White first agreed to the adoption of the children by Mr. and Mrs. Beals, and this statement is substantiated by affidavits in the governor's office. Later he changed his mind and would not withdraw his protest until he was given \$200. His grudge against Beals, however, has smoldered and in Tillamook county he pleaded guilty, it is said to the accusation that he had employed men to kidnap Beals and hold him in the woods until the latter should be given his consent to White's taking the children and to making a substantial payment to the men employed to spirit him away from his home.

State Parole Officer Joe Keller joined Beals in Portland Friday and the two watched for White who had been seen at a rooming house. White had left a grip at the house and by telephone informed the landlord that he would come for it. Later he asked her to deliver it to him at a designated place on Burnside street. She took the grip to the appointed place, but White did not put in an appearance.

White was granted a parole in March of last year on condition that he remain outside of Tillamook county and communicate with persons in that county only through authorities. White has not made reports to the parole officer for about nine months.

The names of the three men who allege that they were drawn into the plot are George Schwartz, Hugh Lewis and Sam Peavy.

This is how they tell the facts of the case.

That on or about the 23rd day of March, 1919, there appeared an advertisement in the Charleston Gazette, which advertised for a chauffeur and I answered the advertisement, when I met a man who gave his name as J. A. Sherard, said advertisement said chauffeur wanted to drive a man to the coast. When I met him he arranged with all of us to go with him stating that he was a secret service man who had a job to get possession of two children who were in the custody of a man who had gotten possession of them illegally, and that the father of such children had offered a reward of \$30,000.00 to the person or persons who would restore such children to him; and that when the job was done he would be willing that we should have the \$30,000 to be divided between us, and he would take all that he could get out of the man who had possession of the children, the said person who had such children being A. G. Beals, of Tillamook, in Tillamook County, Oregon, that we started for the coast in a Max

well automobile and in Missouri got wrecked and from there we came by train to Portland, Oregon, at which place he arranged with Hugh Lewis and George Schwartz, affiants herein, that they should come to Tillamook and secure information as to the whereabouts of said Beals and the said children and to inform him at Portland, Oregon, when he and the said Samuel Peavey would come to Tillamook and the job of securing the children would be carried out. It was understood that if it became necessary that we were to kidnap the said Beals and his wife and the said two children; that in the beginning of the said arrangement, we believed the said Sherard to be a true officer of the U. S. Government, but by the time we got to Tillamook we became suspicious that the said Sherard was not engaged in the said matter in good faith and that he had some bad motive for attempting to kidnap the said persons, and especially when he revealed to us that his purpose was to get money from the said Beals, in case he refused to surrender the said children. In fact he told us that he intended to get money from the said Beals, that he would get all he had and leave him stranded and then send him to the penitentiary.

After examination into the matter we interviewed Mrs. A. G. Beals and the officers and found that Sherard had been confined in the penitentiary for a felony connected with the said children prior to this time and that the name under which he went under at such time was Albert C. White, while he told us his name was Albert C. Sherard, and that he had also gone under the name of J. A. Graham, so concluded to give to the peace officers of Tillamook County what information we had. That after the said Lewis and Schwartz left Portland for Tillamook and the said Sherard was informed of the whereabouts of said Beals, that the said Sherard and Peavey came to Tillamook and camped in the woods about two miles from Tillamook City and we are not certain now whether the said Sherard is in Tillamook County, Oregon, or not; and that we have heard him state that he would go to any extent possible, or words to that effect to get the said children and that if we fall him that he would get the children himself. He further said that when such persons should be kidnaped they should be left in the woods until they came through with what he wanted. He further stated that in case the said Beals should not do as he wanted him to do that he would shoot his brains out. He said that killing him would be too good for him. That the way to fix a rich man was to take away his wealth and then put him in the penitentiary at hard labor for the rest of his life. At Vancouver, Wash., he bought a revolver. He said we would all need a revolver on the job. Schwartz and Lewis came to Tillamook on or about April 6, 1919, and White or Sherard and Peavey came to Tillamook County on or about April 15, 1919. He said his intention was to take them all away in his own car and then destroy the car and leave no evidence and take them away further by some other way. He said the country a mile from Tillamook was wild and it would be hard to locate him.

It seems that White, in leaving Tillamook, boarded the train at Juno and occupied a seat near the newspaper and fruit peddler's stand. The sheriff's office finding that White had left the county telephoned the officials in Portland and three detectives boarded the train at East Portland, who went through the train and even went into the smoker where White was. It seems that White asked when the next boat left for San Francisco, and when told about three days he said he would not wait that long and would have to go by train.

Should White be caught he will be brought back to Tillamook for trial, and the three men will be kept here as witnesses.

Dredging Contract Let.

The Port of Bay City, having disposed of \$40,000 worth of bonds to Morris Bros. of Portland, let a contract last week to the Tacoma Dredging Company to move 1,000,000 cubic yards of material during the present year from the channel at Hobsonville and Garibaldi, which will be used to fill in the property of the Cummings-Moberly Co. at Garibaldi and the Miami Lumber Co.'s mill at Hobsonville, recently purchased by the A. F. Coats interest. We understand that the Cummings-Moberly Co. and the A. F. Coats Lumber Co. pay 10c. a cubic yard, one half of the contract price which was 20 1/2 c. cubic yard. A dredge will be brought from Tacoma and will be operated by electricity furnished by the Coast Power Co., of this city.

The A. F. Coats Lumber Co. has only a few men working at Hobsonville taking out the old boilers.
