The old John Day livery stable at the corner of Third Street and Stillwell Avenue is being wrecked this week. This is an old land mark in Tillamook, and dates back to the early days of the city. When this was built sawmills were not so plentiful as now. The sills and heavy timbers were hewn with a broad-ax. The old timers remember when it was the largest and most up-to-date building in Tillamook.  
The Moose lodge will hold a special high-jinks on Saturday night, May 3rd, at their hall, the occasion being the initiation of a class of 50 new candidates for this progressive order. After initiation refreshments will be served and a good time indulged in and all members of the order are requested to be present. Deputy Supervisor Director, the Hon. Allen R. Joy, of Portland, will be here on this occasion and he brings a message of inspiration and good cheer to all Loyal Moose.  
The Portland office of the Whitney Co., advises that Mr. Russell Hawkins the president is in the east and that as soon as he returns the company will push to completion the Kilchis river railroad into their timber belt between the Kilchis and Wilson river. It is good news to our people that this road will be constructed at an early date as it will provide employment for a large number of men in the building as well as in the logging and milling operations which will soon materialize. With this railroad extended into so large a body of timber, logging and milling operations on Tillamook bay will provide a big growing pay roll for years to come.  
The Tillamook Lodge I. O. O. F., No. 94, have elected the following delegates to the Grand Lodge, which convenes in Salem, Oregon, with Chemeketa Lodge No. 1, the oldest lodge in the state. to the Grand Lodge of the Rebecca Assembly which meets in Salem at the same time. Sisters Wolf and Wilt have been delegated from the Rebecas to receive the degree of chivalry. A big time is expected at the grand lodge this year, as it is the centennial of the order in America and many of the Past Grands and Chief Patriots of Oregon will be there.  
The south half of the block on 4th Street between Second Ave. East and Third Ave. which is the block south of the Tillamook County Bank, has received a cleaning during the past week—the buildings thereon being removed to make way for the construction of a modern fire proof concrete building for a garage, for the firm of Ackley and Miller. This building will be 105 by 143 feet and will have 15,000 square feet of floor space with entrances to the building on all three streets. Ackley and Miller have bought this property at a cost of \$11,000.00, and they are to be commended for their enterprise in giving Tillamook what will be one of the best automobile garages in the state. The building will be modern in every detail. They expect to have it ready for occupancy not later than the middle of July.  
B. A. Folks is running a number of pure bred Holsteins on an official and semi-official test for advance registration and register of merit at his farm on Trask river. There are several of these pure bred Holsteins that are establishing a record for the breed of this county. Professor S. Fine of the O. A. C. came in last week to start the test and was here several days when he was relieved by Miss Gene Kent of the O. A. C., who is now testing and keeping the records of the cows at the Folks farm. Mr. Fine was here for several days visiting county agent, R. C. Jones, and in conversation with the editor stated that Tillamook county was an agreeable surprise to him. He had seen more pure bred cattle in Tillamook than in any other county he had visited, and that we were destined to become a great factor in the near future in breeding pure bred cattle, which sounds very good for the dairy men and live stock breeders of Tillamook county. Prof. Fine stated that he would make Tillamook a visit at any time his services were needed.

**CONGRESSMAN W. C. HAWLEY VISITS DISTRICT.**  
**Interviews Business Interests Connected With the Ports of Bay City and Nehalem and the Roosevelt Highway.**  
The Hon. W. C. Hawley representative in Congress from this district paid Tillamook a visit on Tuesday of this week and met with a few of our leading business men at a banquet at the Hotel Tillamook on Tuesday evening. It seems that there were very few knew of Mr. Hawley coming as a consequence there were not as many of our citizens turned out as there would have been had it become generally known that so distinguished a visitor was to be with us.  
There were several speakers who covered matters connected with the development of this county. Hon. T. B. Handley spoke on the Roosevelt Military Highway bill, our timber and cheese; C. J. Edwards and C. W. Miller made some remarks in general covering the development necessary to the improvement of our harbors and roads in connection with the state and national measures. H. T. Botts acted as toast master of the evening.  
The great address of the evening was by Congressman Hawley, who spoke for about two hours and covered practically every phase of Tillamook's needs in the way of harbor and road and commercial development. Mr. Hawley stated as being on the Ways and Means Committee that he would use his every influence to secure for Tillamook national recognition, that he would call for a full and complete survey of our harbors with all due urgency for immediate action. He spoke in glowing terms of our past development in the cheese, lumber, fishing and berry growing industries and prophesied a rapid advancement in the future. What the people of Tillamook county should now and in the future continue to do, is to co-operate and work together in all matters pertaining to our public welfare and needs.
