## Cheese on the Jump.

Carl Haberlach raised the price of cheese to 34c. this week. This will mean that May cheese should sell for nearly \$300,000.00, a gain of \$100,000.00 over last May. April cheese sold for \$74,000.00 more than last year.

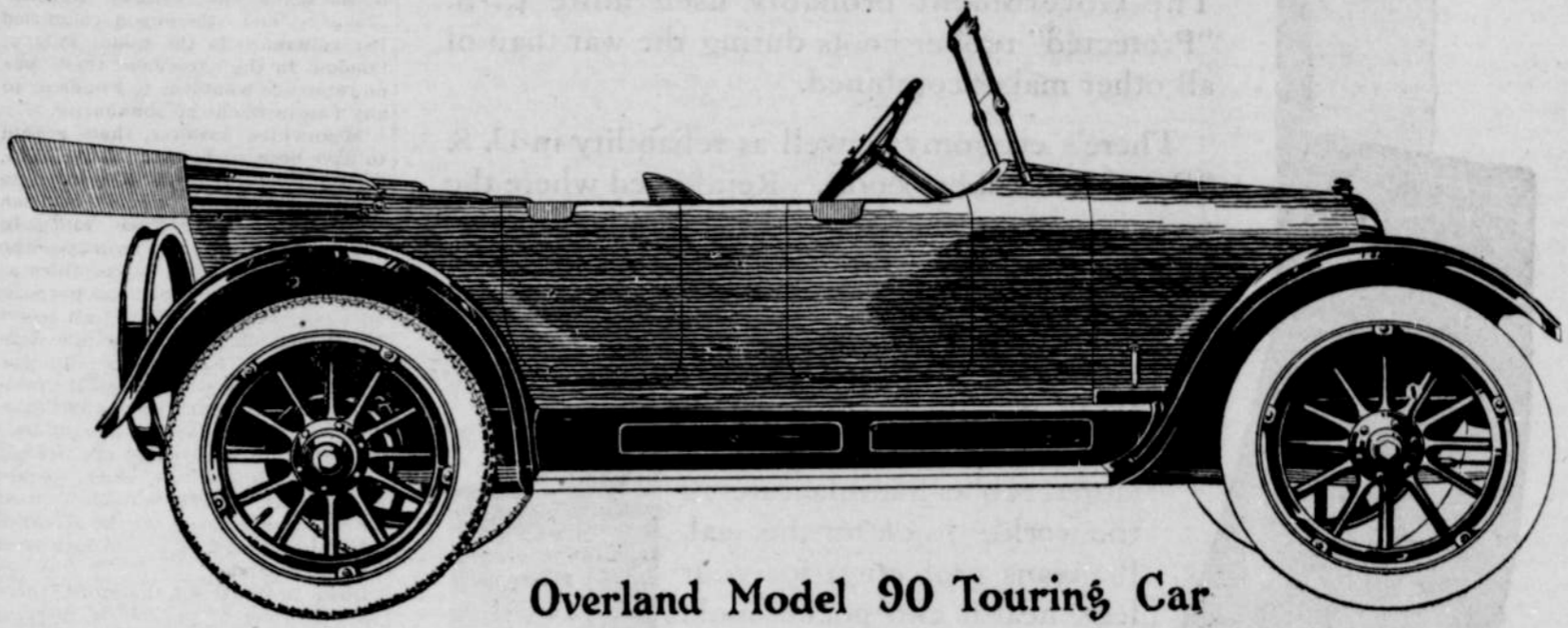
Milk receipts are about 10 to 15 per cent higher than last year.

Carl Haberlach reports that he has sold practically all of the May cheese and some of the June cheese at this price. So far we have heard no complaint from the dairymen that the price was not right. Tillamook should surely come to the front this year if these prices continue. Wisconsin market is about 30c.

## Circuit Court Still in Session.

Circuit Judge Geo. R. Bagley is still holding court in this city and disposed of the following cases:

Eva N. McGee vs. Orpha A. Eastman. Judgment against defendant for \$47.50 by stipulation.

Clara Hiner vs. W. W. Ridehalgh and wife. Settled and dismissed.

Emil Spahr vs. Rudolph Zweifel. Dismissed.

Frank L. Martin vs. John Weiss and son. Judgment for plaintiff for \$450.00. Another judgment was given the plaintiff for \$180.

Laura Jane Martin vs. John Weiss and son. Action for money. Jury disagreed. Reset for next term.

C. O. & C. M. Dawson vs. G. A. James. Judgment for plaintiff.

A. C. Anderson et al vs. L. L. Lee and wife. Judgment for plaintiff.

Henry Diston and Sons, vs. J. A. Jensen. Judgment for plaintiff.

Frank Crane vs. School District No. 14. Demurrer sustained.

Elva Daniel vs. School District No. 9. Demurrer sustained and judgment for defendant.

J. C. Saling vs. C. Mills. Judgment for plaintiff.

Roy W. Donohoe vs. Cressie W. Donohoe. Divorce. Granted.

August M. Hammond vs. Raymond Hammond is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married in Tillamook county January 21, 1917 and the complaint alleges cruel and inhuman treatment. The plaintiff also wants her maiden name restored which was Augusta M. Wallan. Divorce. Granted.

Etna Daniel vs. School District No. 9 is an appeal from the justice court to the supreme court.

Mary Ellen Wilson vs. James R. Wilson is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married the 13th of February, 1904, and no children have been born to the union. The complaint alleges very cruel and inhuman treatment on the part of the defendant, and while the couple were living at Marshfield, Ore., the plaintiff confessed to having improper relations with women roomers. That plaintiff was too good a woman to live with him, and that he intended to leave his wife without making any provisions for her, abandoning her at Marshfield.

Bertha Crane vs. Frank Crane is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married in Tillamook county on the 24th of December, 1886, three children being born to the union. Cruel and inhuman treatment is alleged. Plaintiff was granted a divorce and given care of two children, the defendant to pay \$20.00 per month for their support.

Emily Johnson has appealed from the County Court in the matter of the estate of James Hughes, who claims \$1,041.66.

Lewis L. Smith vs. Mary E. Smith is a divorce suit filed in the circuit

court. These parties were married in Tillamook county on the 29th day of July 1888. The complaint alleges that on the 3rd day of May, 1918, the defendant without cause deserted and abandoned the plaintiff. The plaintiff sought to recover the sum of \$1080.00 the value of personal property sold.
