THE SPECIAL ELECTION

Roosevelt Highway and County Bond Measures Pass With Big Majorities.

The special election on Tuesday last, which was of considerable importance to Tillamook county did not bring out as large a vote as it should have done, but was larger in proportion to population than other counties of the state.

The Roosevelt highway measure and the county bonding measure were the two measures which created more interest in Tillamook County than all other measures, as will be seen by the overwhelming majorities which both received.

The other two measures that were of special interest in the county were the irrigation and market roads measures. These also received a large number of votes in their favor, as will be seen by the following figures:

The \$5,000,000 reconstruction, as well as all other measures obtained good majorities in the county.

It was thought that a large number of precincts would give a 100 per cent vote for the Roosevelt highway measure, but only three out of the thirty precincts did so, viz: Hoquarton, Bayocean and Union.

Although Fairview gave a majority of 30 in favor of the Roosevelt highway, as usual it gave a small majority against county bonds, Wilson, where only seven votes were cast, all the voters voted "No" on all the measures. Netarts showed some signs of bolshevism, where a lot of road money had previously been expended, while Bayocean, without a road and a way out, gave a 100 per cent vote for the Roosevelt highway, and only one vote against county bonds.

A glance at the figures will prove that the people of Tillamook county are overwhelmingly in favor of a hard surfaced road through the entire length of the county, for it is for that purpose that most of the bond money will be used for, in conjunction with the State Highway Commission. It is safe to say that the vote on Tuesday will be instrumental in the State Highway Commission giving this county 15 miles more of hard surfaced road this year.

A great deal of credit is due H. H. Rosenberg and W. G. Dwight, who had charge of the Roosevelt highway campaign for Tillamook county and to State Senator T. B. Handley. It was through their efforts that such a large majority was obtained for that measure in all parts of the state and it is no more than right that the people of this county should show their appreciation of their efforts. For nearly six weeks they gave their time and best efforts to carrying through this measure, which is of vital importance to the future prosperity and development of the county.

ROOSEVELT HIGHWAY HAS 21,000 MAJORITY.

\$5,000,000 Reconstruction and Hospital Measures Lost.

Word was received this morning that the Roosevelt Highway measure had 21,000 majority and still piling up. Only four counties in the state voted against the measure. The \$5,000,000 reconstruction and the hospital measures were defeated. All the other measures it is thought will pull through.

Closing Exercises at Nehalem School

The Nehalem public school closed a very successful term of school with a picnic and track events at Manzanita Beach, Wednesday the 28th. The weather was ideal and the ocean beautiful, and about 100 patrons and pupils enjoyed themselves to the fullest extent. During the term just closed the school had lost just 45 days on account of the "flu" epidemic, but the teachers and pupils rallied themselves and came in "over the top." Sixteen pupils wrote on different subjects at the 8th grade examination held on May 15 and 16, and all passed except two, and these will try again on June 12. The teachers serving the past two years have been H. Brimhall, principal, and Miss Laura Bernard, of Salem, as primary instructor.

The pupils securing 8th grade diplomas were, Victor Olson, Leslie Johnson, Vivian Tohl, and Alice Thompson. Those passing in Geography in the seventh grade were Charles Burmester, Hilda Steel, and Myrtle Crawford, Ira Ludtke in this grade passed in agriculture. Those passing in physiology in the 8th grade were Helen Miller, Helena Burmester, Eva Crawford, Clare McKiddy and Leland Thompson. Harry Crawford and Percy Eggeston, 8th grade students, who failed in only one and two subjects will write again in June.

County School Supt. G. B. Lamb was present at the last day exercises on Tuesday, where he made a fine class address and presented the diplomas. Mr. Lamb has many warm friends in Nehalem, where he taught school 25 years ago.

New School Building in Nehalem.

One of the greatest achievements taking place in the Nehalem Valley in recent years, is the erection in Nehalem City of the fine new \$17,500 public school building, which is now almost completed. The building is 100 feet long and 50 feet wide with a large concrete basement. It has four large well lighted recitation rooms, a library room, a teachers' room, a cloak room for each recitation room, and is modern throughout. The grounds occupy an entire city block in the most sightly part of Nehalem, overlooking as it does the Nehalem river and a beautiful stretch of mountain scenery.
