Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Jackson, of Portland, are at their cottage in Bayocean, Mr. and Mrs. Jackson like to spend a great deal of their time the year around at their beach home. However, they are prevented from doing so on account of the uncertainty of transportation after reaching Tillamook bay. Mr. Jackson has recently installed a very complete electric lighting system at his Bayocean residence.

A meeting of delegates interested in the Roosevelt Highway from the Coast counties will be held at the Imperial Hotel in Portland this (Thursday) evening, when Tillamook will be represented by H. H. Rosenberg of this city. When the result of the election was known all the members of the Oregon delegation at Washington wired their congratulations and promised their support.

A delegation of the Clatsop County Dairymen's League, numbering about 25, with their wives, visited Tillamook. They came in by auto Sunday, having been met at the county line by a number of Tillamook people. On Monday morning the party assembled at the Tillamook Hotel, and headed by County Agriculturist Jones visited a large number of farms and the Maple Leaf, Holstein and Red Clover cheese factories. At noon a lunch was served at John Schild's farm and in the evening the party was tendered a banquet at the Louvre. Owing to the wet weather several large machines were left here, as it was thought they would not be able to get through.

Congressman Hawley writes: "I have received a letter from Secretary Daniels of the Navy Department to the effect that there is on hand at the Navy Yard at Washington, D. C. 1311 memorial tablets made from the metal recovered from the wreck of the old battleship Maine. These tablets are to be disposed of to municipalities, military or naval associations or societies, and the former officers and crew of the Maine or their heirs or representatives. Secretary Daniels says that the estimate cost of the tablets is about \$5 to which should be added the freight or express charges from Washington to destination. Blanks will be furnished by the Navy Department with full instructions to qualify purchasers who may desire to obtain relics."

The Clatsop County dairymen who came to Tillamook county to get an insight of dairying and the methods used in Tillamook county, were greatly surprised at what they saw.

The dairy herds, the splendid blooded stock and the cheese factories were a revelation to them. The largest dairy herd visited was that of Mike Abplanalp, who is milking 70 cows. The herd is milked by machine which takes three persons two hours, and Mike's monthly check runs up to \$2,000. He generates his own electricity and runs his milking machine and electric plant by a gravity water system close by. The Clatsop dairymen are contemplating erecting a cheese factory to take care of their surplus milk, and they did the wise thing to come to Tillamook where they certainly obtained plenty of reliable as well as useful information, and probably they will do the same as Cook county did, send here for cheese makers to operate their factories.

C. B. Sutton and wife, of Roseburg, are in the county visiting their son, C. R. Sutton. They were the first white settlers on Nestucca bay, having taken up a homestead there in 1875, where the cannery now stands, where they lived five years. Mr. Sutton can relate many interesting incidents of the life of the first white settlers in this county, when there were only trails between this city and the south part of the county, consequently did not make many visits here. He was instrumental in getting the first county road between Oretown and Dolph.

Belle F. Cologne vs. School District No. 44 is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$750.00. On the 29th of March, 1917, the plaintiff entered into a contract with the district to teach there, and the contract has never been cancelled. The plaintiff alleges that September last she was ready, willing and able to perform her part of the contract, when the defendant then and there broke its contract and refused to allow the plaintiff to teach the school and unlawfully and wrongfully ordered her to keep away from the school. Fred Seeley, chairman of the board of directors wrote her: "As you presenting yourself to the Wheeler school house on September 3 or 10, or any other date, let it be understood, once for all, you are forbidden to attempt any such intimidation of the teachers that are selected by the present directors of this district, but if you attempt to carry your troubles into the schools in the coming school year, you do so at your own peril." The plaintiff claims that she has been wronged to the amount of \$750 and now sues for the same.

## Holstein Breeders Meet.

A crowd of about fifty enthusiastic Holstein boosters met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Gilmore on Friday evening, June 6th.

The men spent the early part of the evening in looking over Mr. Gilmore's fine herd of Holsteins, which consist chiefly of purebreds, while the women enjoyed a social hour before all gathered together for the business meeting.

A keen interest in the coming county fair was shown by the lively discussions and the association voted \$100.00 to be given in special prizes for Holstein exhibited there.

"Tillamook on the Rind" and other points of the advertising campaign were explained by Ben Kuppenbender, also the efforts of the Cheese Makers' Association to bring about a greater uniformity in the output of the various factories. This was very instructive and the Holstein people were glad to know of the work being done to better Tillamook cheese and bring it before the eyes of the world.

Ice cream and cake was served to the guests at a late hour, after which all departed from this pleasant gathering to meet again on June 25th for the all day annual picnic to be held at Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Rupp's.

## California People Enthusiastic Over Tillamook Cheese.

Ben Kuppenbender, president of the Tillamook Co. Creamery Association has just returned from a trip through California and reports that Tillamook cheese has fully established itself as the quality cheese there. As far as he knows Tillamook is the only advertised trade marked cheese in the United States, and we are reaping the benefit of the many years of hard work which our dairymen spent in perfecting our herds, introducing modern methods of manufacture and standardizing our product and so placing our trade mark "Tillamook" on every piece, and that the last piece is just like the first one. In San Francisco and Los Angeles he found Wisconsin cheese competing strongly at 2 1/2 and 3 1/2 cents below Tillamook cheese. Some of the jobbers objected to our brand being put on our cheese, but they were politely told that after all the hard work and effort we have put in to create a reputation for Tillamook cheese we feel justified in insisting that it be sold as a Tillamook product. As a whole, all of the jobbers and retailers on the Pacific coast are co-operating in a splendid way with us and express themselves as being strongly in favor of Tillamook cheese. It is a standardized cheese of quality. Tillamook cheese will probably never again be really plentiful. The advertising is establishing it definitely, and the sound business sense of the Tillamook dairymen will prompt them to constantly develop their product. Thus a combination of good dairying backed up by modern methods of advertising and selling are definitely solving for our section at least the problem of co-operative selling to the end that the individual farmer and dairymen may be protected and be in a position to promote his business along sound progressive lines.

## Artistic Settings in Metro's "Satan Junior."
