Jesse C. Remick, wealthy lumberman who died April 7, 1919, left an estate valued at \$138,598.79, according to the appraisal filed in the Multnomah Circuit Court Tuesday. The chief item was \$35 shares of the Cummings Moberly Lumber company valued at \$83,500. There were 379.12 shares in the Whitney company, valued at \$41,205.54. The appraisers were John H. Burgard, George H. Brodie and R. G. Jubitz.
A meeting of the representatives of the Coast counties was held in Portland last week, when it was decided to send a delegation to Washington at once, and the gentlemen selected were Chas. Hall, president of the State Chamber of Commerce, L. J. Simpson and B. F. Jones, to take up with the Oregon delegation the matter of obtaining the money from the government for the Roosevelt highway. The delegation will be in Washington on the 28th of this month, and it is expected that it will be joined by two members of the Pacific Coast Defense League. The expenses of the coast delegation will be paid by the coast counties.
The Bayocean Road Association is the name of an organization that was formed on Tuesday evening with Attorney H. T. Botts president, and County Assessor C. A. Johnson, secretary, which is composed of property owners and others who have property on the South side of Tillamook bay. It is the purpose if possible, to have the Bayocean road finished as soon as possible. There are indications that several industries will be located on that side of the bay as soon as the road is completed. There are also between 600 and 700 lot owners at Bayocean who are also interested in the completion of the road, for they are paying taxes with no road out.
Edward Hanson vs. Rose Hanson is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married at Bend, Ore., on January 1, 1916, and one child was born to the union. It is alleged that defendant exercised toward the plaintiff a course of cruel and inhuman treatment. She left plaintiff, March, 1919, and went to Garibaldi, where the defendant lived and cohabited with one Charles Mitchell for a period of two weeks. On the 15th of May last the defendant received from Mitchell and exhibited to the plaintiff a letter containing evidences of affection on the part of Mitchell for the defendant and more particularly certain crossings or markings intended to represent kisses. When the defendant left plaintiff she took liberty loan bonds valued at \$1000, drew upon the plaintiff's employers for the sum of \$10.00 and appropriated \$30.00 that was given her to pay a grocery bill.
Andrew Peterson vs. Charles F. Blum and Minnie B. Blum, James Pallin and F. R. Beals is a suit filed in the circuit court. The plaintiff alleges that on the 8th of August, 1916, and for a long period of time prior to that date, viz. from September, 1915, was in actual possession and entitled to possession of certain real property, and owned and held the legal title in fee simple in and to an undivided one-half interest in the same; that on the 8th of August, 1916, while the plaintiff was in possession of the property, the defendants entered into the possession of the property and ousted the plaintiff, and took possession under a claim of right and adversely to plaintiff, and since then the defendants have unlawfully, wrongfully and without right and against the will of the plaintiff, withheld possession of said property to the damage of the plaintiff in the sum of \$10,000.

Fire Losses in Tillamook County For 1918—\$37,637.76.

The 2nd annual report, of the State Fire Marshal's Office, at hand, showing that during the year 1918 the number of losses sustained in Tillamook County amounted to 27, 12 dwellings and contents \$8,127.60 4 farm dwellings and contents 1,360.00 4 mercantile buildings and contents 11,806.50 3 mfg. buildings and wood-working plants 8,500.00 3 hotels, apartments, rooming houses, etc. 2,843.00 1 gen. storage warehouse 5,000.00 The amount of insurance at risks involved amounted to \$160,691.00. This shows a considerable loss ratio to premiums income for the county. The losses paid amounting to over \$3,000.00 a month.
As the dry season is now approaching it behooves every one of us to be exceedingly careful about fire—especially in the burning of rubbish or brush close to exposures of buildings—as one of our first fires occasioned a loss last year by practically destroying the town of Beaver which caused the heaviest part of the loss in Tillamook County. If proper precautions are taken fire losses in Tillamook County for this year should become a minimum. A little carelessness may cause the loss of your property and possibly your life.

Y. M. C. A. Makes Explanation.

To the Editor of the Headlight.
Dear Sir—My attention has been called to an editorial in a recent number of your paper requesting that some explanation be made relative to the statement of the local Y. M. C. A.'s having paid off their mortgage indebtedness from War Work Funds. May I state that this is absolutely untrue and the records of any association in the country are open to investigation. The matter of mortgages can be verified by examination of the records in the county offices.
The story relative to the Portland Association probably came about in this way. In the War Work drive in November 1917, which was for Y. M. C. A. work alone, it was agreed in Portland that any amount in excess of Portland's quota for the War Work might be applied to the local work and to meeting certain current expense indebtedness which was occasioned by the war. On account of large contributions being made for the war work, the local association could not raise funds for their own current expenses and as they were giving privileges free to the soldiers which involved considerable cost, it seemed only fair that a small percentage of the funds raised should be set aside for this purpose. This was definitely understood by all men participating in the campaign and was given proper publicity throughout the city. The Portland Association on this basis did realize about \$10,000 which was used to pay certain current expense debts occasioned by the war. Absolutely no money was paid on the mortgage indebtedness of the building which has stood at \$100,000 for several years, in fact ever since the building was first erected. At the present time the Board of Directors are making application to the Equitable Life Insurance Co. for a renewal of the mortgage of \$100,000. I am enclosing herewith a financial statement of the Portland Association which has been audited by the leading firm of public accountants in this city and which shows a mortgage indebtedness of \$105,000 and additional notes of \$34,000.
The money raised in November 1918, for United War Work was entirely separate from the regular Y. M. C. A. organization so that it will not be possible to take funds from this source. We trust you will give the same publicity to the facts in the case as you have to the accusation.
