As the dry season is now approaching it behoves every one of us to be exceedingly careful about -fire-especially in the burning of rubbish or brush close to exposures of buildings-as one of our first fires occasioned a loss last year by practically destroying the town of Beaver which caused the heaviest part of the loss in Tillamook County. If proper precautions are taken fire losses in Tillamook County for this year should become a minimum. A little carelessness may cause the loss of your property and possibly your life.
