Editorial Snap Shots.

Notwithstanding that Douglas county gave a vote of 787 for and 2,044 against the irrigation measure, the Coast counties gave that measure a majority of 3,836. It was the counties that swapped votes with Eastern Oregon that brought about this result.

How can Republicans who aspire to office and who tie up with Democratic newspapers, expect support from the Headlight? We are going to be outspoken. They won't get it. True it is their privilege to do so, but why support Democratic newspapers which are going to do their best to defeat the Republican party?

The Democrats of Oregon are getting their political machines in order and lining up the Democratic newspapers for the presidential campaign next year. There are now three Democratic newspapers in Tillamook county, and they will have some job on their hands for the Republican slogan will be Democratic extravaganza.

Rev. gentleman who runs the daily paper is a poor specimen of a Christian. Last week he wanted county court criminally prosecuted and this week threatens a call. Evidently the gentleman has forgotten some of the precepts of the old book. What is the matter with Bro. Blalock's Christianity, anyway, for it is sadly out of joint with genuine Christianity?

Which is it? Wilson said it was wrong to form alliances in 1916, but in 1919 is advocating it. This is what he said in 1916: "It was not merely because of passing the transient circumstances that Washington said we must keep free from entangling alliances. It was because he saw that no country had yet set its face in the same direction in which America had set her face. We can not form alliances with those who are not going our way; in our mind and majesty and in the confidence and definiteness of our own purpose we need not and should not form alliances with any nation in the world."

China was perfectly justified in not signing the treaty of peace. What would the people of the United States think if the peace conference took away part of this country and 40,000,000 citizens and gave them to Japan? But that is the treatment China received, although she was one of the countries that declined war against Germany. We don't think Germany has any reason to whine on account of the terms she has to submit to, by China has cause to be religiously indignant at the unjust treatment in taking the province of Shantung from that country and giving it to the yellow race.

A visitor to Tillamook informed us that the city should have a daily newspaper. Well, the field is wide open for anyone who is looking for a strenuous job and who has a bank account if he wants to reduce. Here's his opportunity. It takes a lot of wide-awake business men who advertise to keep a daily newspaper going, and this city has not a very large percentage of that class. In some business men adopt a Jew system—allow their competitors to do the advertising with the idea of catching some of the people who are brought to the city through advertisements.

The people of the United States were exceedingly hostile to pro-Germans during the war, and they had just cause to be, yet we cannot understand how so many of our citizens are in sympathy with the Sinn Feins who were in sympathy with Germany. Most all countries that declared war against Germany resorted to conscription, and when this was proposed for Ireland, the Sinn Feiners revolted. We believe the government should deport the Sinn Feiners the same as they are the pro-Germans. They were enemies of the United States and should be classed as pro-Germans.

Dr. Theobald von Bethmann-Hollweg, ex-German Chancellor, has formally asked the allied and associated powers to place him on trial instead of the ex-emperor. The ex-chancellor says that he assumes responsibility for the acts of Germany during his period of office and places himself at the disposal of the allies. Probably the allies have already selected the ex-chancellor as well as the ex-king, for trial. It is very significant that still in power in Germany, by the way they are endeavoring to prevent the ex-king from being tried. It is

to be hoped that the baby killers and human butchers who were responsible for so much cruelty and barbarism will have to pay the penalty with their lives for plunging the world into war.

What's the matter with our own good Methodist friends and the city officials that they don't do something to improve the pavement opposite the church property? Gee wiz, it looks rotten as well as dangerous for pedestrians. Will somebody please inform us why the city compels some property owners to improve their property and not others. Whether it is private or church property looks all alike to the snap shot man. We believe that charity should commence at home, and as our good friends raised a goodly sum for the centennial, somehow it doesn't look exactly right to us to see the church property and sidewalk go to rack and ruin.

Tillamook City is a live business center, ideally located, but, oh my, those old shacks are a disgrace to any progressive city. Condemn and order them pulled down would be a good stunt. Talk about moss backs, why, we have them in Tillamook City, who want to do business the same way it was done a hundred years ago. Let's have more civic pride, for as long as the old shacks are allowed to stand they are a detriment and eye sore to the city. We are inclined to think that if photographs were taken of some of the old shacks and put in the local newspapers with the owners' names attached, it might do some good. It is impossible to have a bright, clean, looking city with a lot of old unsanitary fire traps in all parts of the business center. That's the gospel truth. The city needs a tank for a few days to butt into some of the old shacks. The spirit of enterprise should now predominate in Tillamook City. There is every reason to believe that this city has reached a stage in his history when it is going to grow and develop rapidly. We are not saying this to cause a boom or cause excitement, for the snap shot man does not like a city or county boom, but there is going to be a steady growth from now on, and for that reason every business man and progressive citizen should get into the harness and help bring about a transformation and wonderful improvement in the appearance of Tillamook City. This is not only good horse sense, but good business sense as well, and we hope those who are interested in the business life and progress and prosperity of the city will get the proper boosting spirit. There may be some knockers, objectors, mossbacks, grumblers and old fogies to contend with, which is natural, but this must not interfere with the spirit of progress that is in the air.

It is hoped that the treaty of peace and the league of nations will accomplish all that President Wilson predicts, by bringing about a new era in the history of the world. That there is much to be done before a more friendly spirit exists between the nations of the world is generally conceded, for there are many vexed questions to be solved, with Germany still possessed of an arrogant and revengeful spirit towards the allies. As long as Germany is ruled by the military and the junkers there is going to be more or less trouble with that country, but with the United States and England pledged to go to the support of France should Germany ever attempt to invade France, will probably put a stop to Germany's aspirations in that direction. It was hard to make the people of the United States believe, when war was declared, that Germany was intent on a world conquest, and it took several years to convince even President Wilson that it was her intention not only to subdue the nations of Europe, but the United States as well, and make this country pay Germany for the cost of the war. It was on that account that the United States was late in getting in to the war. There is no doubt but what the United States helped to win the war long before it entered the horrible conflict, for the food and munitions of war that were shipped to France and England enabled those countries to prosecute the war with more vigor. France and England stood the blunt of the war for several years, and when the United States went to their assistance it soon brought about the defeat of the most blood thirsty, arrogant nation in the history of the world. Now that the treaty of peace is signed it is probably as well to take the advice of Lloyd George, who said: "I sincerely trust that the unity of spirit and concord which won this great peace will continue until we have established on a firm foundation the new world won by the sacrifices of millions of brave men. Let us thank God for the great victory, not in a spirit of boastfulness, which was the downfall of Germany, but in a spirit of reverence worthy the noble sacrifices that have been made."

The Cloverdale and Wheeler newspapers need a little sensible education. They keep harping about spending the bond money for road improvements and a bridge at Wheeler, the Enterprise even threatened a recall election if the road between Cloverdale and the Little Nestucca bridge is not hard surfaced. It was the purpose of those who advocated bonding the county for permanent

roads that the money was to be used only when state and federal aid could be obtained on a 50-50 basis, and we believe this to be the opinion of every level-headed taxpayer of the county. To our way of thinking it would be foolish to blow in the bond money without obtaining state or federal assistance. The snap shot man is just as anxious, and even more so, than a good many persons to see a hard surfaced road through the county, and we are fully aware that \$430,000, to be raised by the sale of bonds, will not complete the work, hence this is no time to blow in the bond money and then have none left to match state or federal money. Every person who thoroughly understands the situation will agree with us that this is the time to go slow and wait developments. This is what the State Highway Commission and the County Court is doing, until such times as it is known what action the government will take in matching the \$2,500,000 for the Roosevelt Highway. A deputation is now in Washington from the Coast counties. It is going to save the taxpayers of Tillamook county hundreds of thousands of dollars if the government agree to go ahead with the Roosevelt highway, and it is wise to play a waiting game for several weeks, for if the state and government is going to build the highway, the county court is doing the right thing by not expending the money until such time as state or federal money is available. It will, no doubt, delay some of the road work in the county this year, but in the end it will be to the county's advantage to go slow now. The snap shot man is opposed to expending the bond money unless the state or government come through on a 50-50 basis. For the information of the citizens of the county few know what the cost of grading and hardsurfacing different sections of the highway will cost. The Reporter is agitating for a bridge at Wheeler, which with the approaches, will cost \$125,000, and to survey, grade and hardsurface the road from Garibaldi to Wheeler will cost at least \$400,000. The State Highway Commission has made a preliminary survey for the highway in the north part of the county, and until such time as the commission decides this point, it would be foolish for the county court to expend money where the highway is not permanently located. We mention these two items to prove our contention that it is absolutely necessary to obtain state and federal aid to complete the highway through the county. It will cost \$1,000,000 and there is only \$430,000 in sight. Failing to obtain state or federal aid, it will be necessary to have another bond election. This should be avoided, if possible, and if the people will be a little patient and refrain from wanting to blow in the bond money right away, they will be acting wisely, not only from the county's standpoint, but will save the taxpayers considerable money. A few years ago a number of counties in Oregon went off half cocked and bonded to their limit, with the expectation that the bond money would do considerable more road work than it did. A good deal of dissatisfaction followed and county courts were accused of squandering the money. We do not want to see a repetition of this in Tillamook county, but we do want to see that every \$1.00 spent on the highway is matched with another \$1.00 from the state or government. We want to say to the Cloverdale and Wheeler newspapers that it is impossible to do a \$1,000,000 job with less than half the money available.

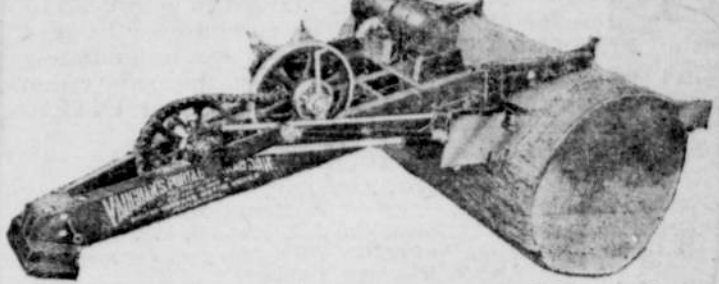
