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Editorial Snap Shots.

Moles appear to be getting very numerous in Tillamook county, and for that reason it would not be out of place to have a round up of moles.

It is safe to say that some of the war lords of Germany are sweating drops of blood now that it is known that the allies are going to hang some of the women murderers and baby killers.

Barnum said that the American people liked to be humbugged, and the Willard-Dempsey fight last week was another illustration of how easily the humbug trick can be worked. We believe it was nothing but a frame up to obtain the gate money.

It is a little remarkable that where county bond measures were an issue at the special election last month, they all carried, Klamath and Wheeler counties for the second time. That is a pretty good indication how people feel about good roads. There were 18 counties that voted on bonds.

Douglas county, called the "meanest county in Oregon", could have saved the \$5,000,000 bond amendment, for the state gave it a majority of 93 votes outside of Douglas. The vote for that county was 646 for and 2,189 against. What's the matter with Douglas county anyway, that it had such a grouchy spirit the day of election?

It is just as well to make up our minds that Germany will embroil the world in another war at the first opportunity, that is if the military and junker class continue to rule that country, who will tear up the treaty of peace as a "scrap of paper". She will work, plot, scheme and connive to that end, with probably some of the Balkan states lined up with her, for there is no telling how long the league of nations will hold together, even if that is adopted.

The province of Shantung, China, comprising something like 10,000 square miles of territory, was taken from China by the peace conference and handed over to Japan. Unless this crime against the Republic of China is eliminated from the peace treaty, due to pressure that is being brought to bear to get the Peace Conference to change its action touching Shantung, the peace treaty will be submitted to the United States Senate for approval with this outrage against China incorporated in it. If it is so submitted, will the Senate accept the treaty?

William Jennings Bryan, after a trip through Europe, on his return to the United States, addressed a meeting in New York advocating government ownership of railroads, making it one of the issues of the Democratic party. The present Democratic administration is now in control of the railroads, and the result that there is poor service, higher passenger and freight rates, with the country plunged into debt several billion dollars. Mr. Bryan is to speak at the Chautauqua in this city, but it is safe to say it will not be government ownership of railroads after the big muddle the Democratic party made in operating the railroads.

The Germans are going to be just as treacherous, and even more so, than before, scheming to get into the good graces of the allied powers with the purpose in view of gaining a point here and there until she is in a position to renew the war. The people of the United States should not allow themselves to be hoodwinked by Germany's trickery and plotting, and the efforts of pro-Germans. It may not be out of place to quote here an interview of General Mangia, commander of the French army of occupation in Germany, who said: "You Americans are not informed regarding the real situation in Germany. You are too much inclined to trust Germany and conclude, now that peace is assured, that she is ready to wash her hands and live hereafter an honest, straight forward life. Do not be misled. The Germans have no intention of doing that. . . . We do not trust the Germans a single inch. We know them and we do not trust them." It must be remembered that of all important continental countries Germany is the one that has suffered least from the war. Indeed, in some of the most important respects she has not suffered at all. Her agricultural lands have not been ravaged, her orchards and forests have not been cut down, her factories have not been destroyed, her machinery and goods have not been stolen. She is immeasurably richer in her indus-

trial resources today than she was at the beginning of the war, and is able to resume her competition for the mastery of the world with far greater advantage over her rivals than she ever before enjoyed.

THE MUMBLING RAVINGS OF A CRACKED BRAINED PREACHER.

He owes an apology for such an accusation against them. There may be a few who read the Headlight who do not take the Enterprise and they will not know any better as the Headlight man is noted for truth and veracity. As to the religious side of the matter, I have said nothing about the Court's religion or my own, neither can they nor I compare with the Headlight man, for he is the religious critic of the Archangel and patron saint of Lucifer. In his position as critic he claims that Wayne Jackson was killed by his speeding, when the evidence indicated that he was not running more than ten or twelve miles an hour. Nazarene Church Services.

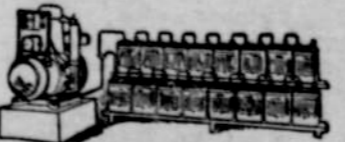
