

**ATTORNEY ALLOWED \$4250.**  
**Ralph Duniway Wins in Action Against C. E. Hadley.**

Attorney Ralph R. Duniway was awarded a fee of \$4250 by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Gatens in Portland for services rendered C. E. Hadley in litigation during 1912 to 1914. He asked \$7500. The defendant maintained he had paid \$750, that \$400 of a contract price remained to be paid but that he had offered \$500 more.

Duniway represented Hadley in the suit of Otelia Hadley against C. E. Hadley, in which the stepmother of the defendant endeavored to show that the business operated by C. E. Hadley was not the son's but in partnership with his father, C. B. Hadley, deceased. There was \$250,000 involved but the case was settled for \$7000 after going to the supreme court.

**County Court Sells Bonds.**

The County Court on Saturday had 14 bids for the \$78,000, 5 1/2 percent road bonds, and the bid of Morris Bros., of Portland, was accepted at a premium of \$2155.92. There was one better bid, that of the Detroit Trust Co., which offered a premium of \$2161.00, but as the bid was not accompanied by a certified check, as called for in the advertisement, the court could not consider the bid.

This is the first bond issue under the \$430,000 bond measure voted at the special election for permanent road building, and is to pay for the grading of the five miles of road south of this city, which the State Highway Commission is hard surfacing, and for grading the road north of this city which it is expected that the Highway Commission will also hard surface this year, it being the intention of the county court to have the road hard surfaced to Garibaldi as soon as possible.

The County Court expects to offer for sale next February or March an additional amount in the neighborhood of \$150,000 of these bonds.

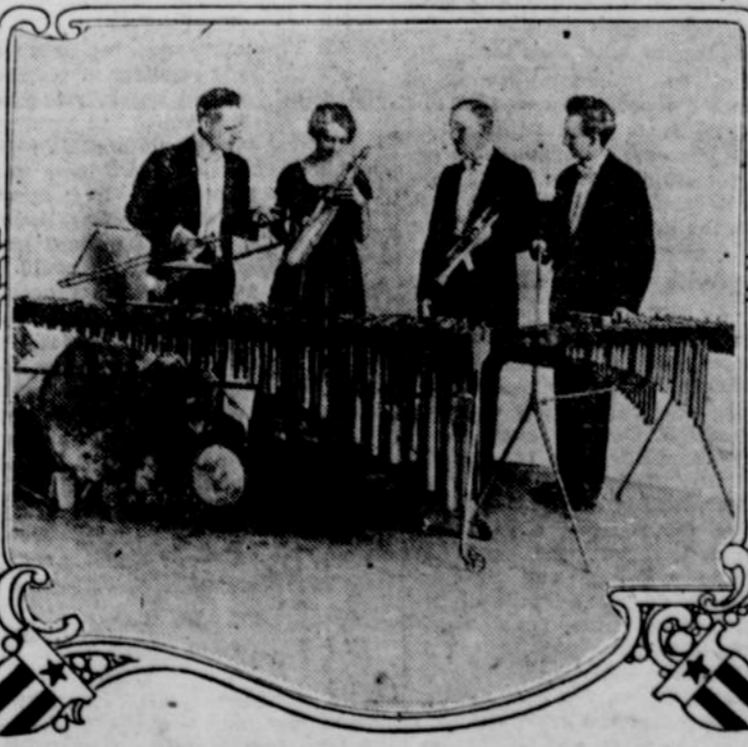
**The Music of "Victory Day"**
