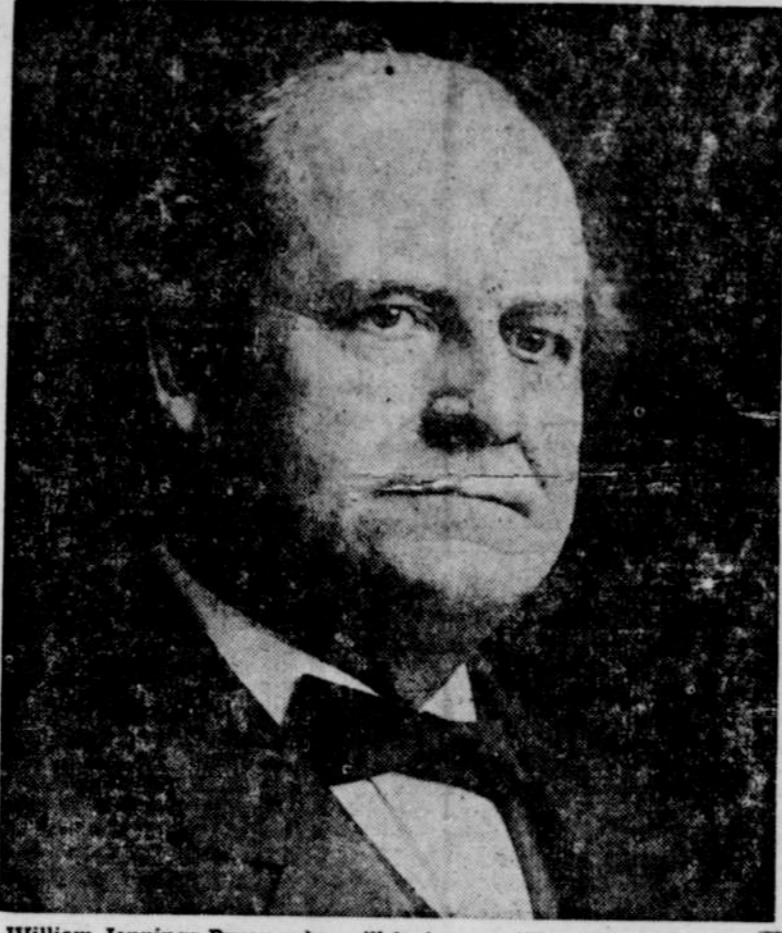
...F. M. Lamb and Mrs. Lamb left for Eugene after camping on their farm here for a week or so. They will return in a few weeks and go out on their farm again.

...Carl Haberlach reports the cheese market as being firm, with triplets selling at 33c. and Young Americas and Longhorns at 34c. All cheese has been sold that is ready for shipment, but this being the mid-summer season in California, buying has not been as brisk as during the last three months. It is not expected, however, that the market will go lower for some time. There has been a little export demand, mostly for uncolored cheese, one inquiry being for 3,000 boxes. If prices can be agreed on, Mr. Haberlach says they will make a great deal of the surplus for the next couple of weeks and take the cheese out of the country. On the other hand, it has not been thought desirable to have the regular trade channels filled with other cheese to supplant Tillamook.
