BEACH VS. MIAMI ROUTE.

There is a difference of nearly \$1,000,000 between the cost of building the state highway by way of the beach and Miami. This seems to be a glaring statement to make, and, no doubt, it will greatly surprise a large number of our citizens, who never realized that the beach route could cost such a large amount of money. But these figures appear to be the estimate of the state engineers who were instructed to make an estimate of the cost of both routes. To grade and hardsurface the road from Garibaldi to one mile of the Clatsop county line, which is 22.1 miles, .including a draw bridge at Wheeler, is estimated to cost \$1,424,823, or \$53,-000 a mile, without the bridge. The Miami route, from the bridge to one mile of the county line, a distance of 17.1 miles, to grade and pave with one bridge to cost \$30,000, the estimate cost is \$451,659, or a difference of exactly \$973,164, with five miles less in the distance in favor of the Miami road. The average cost per mile without the bridge is \$24,000. So as to connect the south side of Nehalem bay and Garibaldi beach with the state highway, the engineers propose to build a spur from the Miami road to Garibaldi and from the highway to Wheeler, the two spurs being 33/4 miles and to be hardsurfaced. The additional expense of building these two spurs is estimated at \$121,-653, which would be a saving of \$851,511 in favor of the Miami route with the two spurs included. These figures will provide plenty of food for reflection and discussion. They are simply a small summary of the report that has been prepared for the State Highway Commission. Under the circumstances what is the best and wisest course for the county to pursue? There is every reason to be-lieve that the State Highway Com-mission will agree to go 50-50 on the Miami project, but would not do so on the beach route. This would mean that the Miami route would cost the taxpayers of this county \$286,650, and we believe it would be money wisely expended and would do justice to the north part of the county. The engineers estimate of the draw bridge at Wheeler is over \$200,000, while the bridge on the Miami is estimated at only \$30,000. A draw bridge across Nehalem bay would be a perpetual expense to the taxpayers the engineers argued.. Mr. Furuseth was right in saying that this clause not only did not do what the labor interests were demanding, but did the exactly opposite thing, by declaring that labor is principally a commodity. \$750,000 Hay Crop Expected in Tillamook County.


