The following list of the main accomplishments of the Thirteenth Canadian Parliament recently adjourned at Ottawa, represents a rather imposing record: A bill granting \$20,000,000 as federal aid to building; A bill creating a federal department of public health; Soldiers' land settlement bill; Measures providing loans to provinces to improve housing conditions; Bill providing liberal increases in pensions; Consolidation of the Dominion railway act; Bill providing for grant of \$10,000,000 to technical education; Bill creating a court of commerce and another restraining the operations of trust and combines; Important revision of tariff schedules, involving decrease in custom duties to the extent of \$17,000,000; New immigration act to decrease the quantity and improve the quality of immigrants; Amendments to the Criminal Code defining sedition and increasing penalties for those found guilty of it; Creation of an air board with power to deal with all matters pertaining to aerial development in Canada.

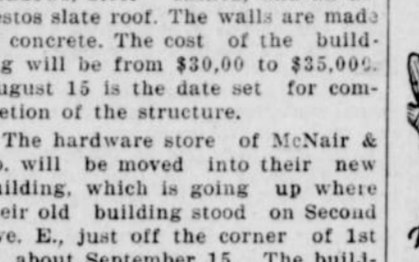
