A Typical Case of Administration Extravagance. (By Representative Frank L. Greene of Iowa.) The Republican members of Congress are finding it as difficult to curb the extravagance of the various departments in time of peace as it was while the war was going on. There may have been some excuse for the waste of money in time of war, but certainly there is not now that the war is closed, nevertheless it requires a constant struggle on the part of Congress to hold the expenditures down to a reasonable basis, and even with every effort on the part of Republicans and assistance on the part of some of the Democratic members, the administration still continues to squander immense sums.

An example of what has been done in this line, since the war was over, is found in the purchase of the camp known as Fort Benning, near Columbus, Ga., since the armistice was signed, in utter defiance to the expressed will of Congress.

The proposition involved was to purchase about three hundred fifteen to one hundred thirty thousand acres of land, which was mostly in cultivation in Georgia, requiring about seven million dollars for the land and several millions more for improvements. When purchased, it was intended to use this camp as a firing center for artillery and also as a range for small arms, and to abandon the camp of Fort Still, Oklahoma which had been acquired for the same purpose.

"Entirely Discontinued" After the armistice had been signed and before the adjournment of the last Congress, the Secretary of War presented this proposition, first to the military committee of the House and then, to the committee on Military Affairs in the Senate. The House committee declined to approve the project, understanding that if it was not approved, that nothing would be done with relation to it. The Senate committee took action, and after hearing a large number of witnesses advised the War Department that it disapproved the project. Secretary Baker then appeared before the House committee on Military Affairs and, referring to the action of the senate, informed the House committee that: "We have entirely discontinued the purchase at Columbus, Ga."

No sooner, however, had Congress adjourned, so that no further action could be taken, the War Department proceeded to make contracts for the land at Fort Benning, and to expend on land and building a total of about two million three hundred thousand, before Congress could act. A provision was inserted in the Military bill, forbidding further expenditures on this project and in the discussion of the matter, the action of the War Department was vigorously denounced in the House by Congressman McKenzie, (Illinois), and others; and in the Senate by Senator Lenroot, Senator New and others. It is not necessary however, to quote from Republicans in order to show how high-handed this proceeding was, and how recklessly millions have been wasted. The proposition was so outrageous and indefensible that it was condemned by some of the leading Democrats. Mr. Ferris (Democrat), of Oklahoma, wrote two letters to the Secretary of War, while the purchase of land at Fort Benning was going on, calling attention to the wrong which had been done, in abandoning Fort Still, and creating a new camp at Benning. In the Senate discussion, some claim was made that Fort Still was not large enough, but Senator Gore, (Democrat), replied that it contained forty-six thousand acres, and was joined by a government reserve, which was not being used, containing sixty-five thousand acres; that shells could be thrown twenty-five or thirty miles without getting off the government property.

Senator King, (Democrat), spoke of the "illegal and defiant attitude" of the War Department in this matter, and said that its officers had acted "against the best interests of the country." Senator Owens (Democrat) said: "The conduct of the War Department discloses a proceeding which seems exceedingly scandalous." "Case of Impeachment." The annals of this country will fail to show more senseless, reckless, and wanton waste of money, than this case.

At Fort Still, the government already had more land than it could possibly use. It was admirably adapted for the purpose of both an artillery and infantry range. It was high and dry, and at the same time well supplied with water, and over two million dollars had been spent in buildings on it, yet the Secretary of War, knowing that he could not get the approval of Congress for the Benning project, waited until Congress adjourned, and then undertook to bind the government by contracts, so that the Benning project could be completed. In his defense, it was claimed by Democratic members in the House, that he had the legal right to purchase this land. This was disputed, but it is unnecessary to determine whether he had the legal right. Certainly he had no moral right to purchase the land, when it was not needed, and it was clearly an usurpation of power, when knowing that congress disapproved the project, he went on with it during its adjournment. Senator Lenroot correctly stated that the action of the Secretary of War presented a case for impeachment.

The situation now is such that it seems likely that nothing can be done but to pay for the land which has already been contracted for, upon which the War Department has erected buildings and improvements, and stop the further purchase, which was accordingly done by Congress, but how is it possible for Congress to bring about the economies which ought to be effected under an administration that proceeds in this manner? While the Benning camp presents one of the most flagrant instances, it is only one of many. We have a similar situation with reference to hospitals. At the close of the war, it was claimed that new hospitals would have to be constructed to take care of the wounded that would come back from France, millions were appropriated for that purpose. Now, it appears that we have hospitals all over the country that are not only partly filled, but the Secretary of the Treasury is going on buying more land for hospitals and making preparations to construct more buildings.

I am not satisfied with the conditions however under which these cattle are being developed. As there has been no official work done on these cows whatever.

Let us see what the conditions are at this time. First the breeder who wants a pure bred bull or cow would not entertain having at all unless the animal had a good showing record backing—the better the record

The sooner that the pure bred stock raiser of the dairy animal gets into the official testing game, the sooner he will be able to command prices for his young stock that he is now asking for animals that have no official backing in advance registry or register of merit class. Yet if they want to buy an animal they are all looking for the official backing, so how in the love of "Mike" can they expect prices for their young stuff that they are not backing with official testing?
