Sufficient Number of Signers Secured to Bring Organization Back.

At the final night of the successful chautauqua season just closed Miss Inez Bristol, the director, announced that the contract for next year had been signed, and Tillamook would have the privilege again of chautauqua's entertainers.

The week just closed has been a success in every way—financially, optically, esthetically and intellectually. The eye has been pleased with the fine appearance of the actors, the symphony of the musicals and the excellent, thought-inspiring talks of the lecturers has helped many to a new vision. The seat sale was oversubscribed, making a sound financial gain for the system. The chautauqua is rapidly doing away with the old assertions that high class entertainment could not be a financial success in America, and credit is due to Ellison and White for making this possible.

The Junior Chautauquans pleased their friends and relatives greatly when they put on the closing pageant, "The Boy Who Wanted to be a Farmer." Miss Bess Bagley, who directed the performance, and coached the actors in five short days of which a great deal of credit, some of which the audience showed by their sympathetic smiles and nods, and then by the cheerful handclapping. The children of Tillamook, showed capability and brains to learn to do the things they did, and speak their parts in so short a time, Miss Bagley said.

FIRE MARSHALS BEGIN INSPECTION HERE.

Will Report to City What Buildings Are Unsafe. Complete Survey Planned.

Deputy State Fire Marshals, Geo. W. Stokes and Gilbert W. Allen arrived in Tillamook yesterday, for the purpose of assisting the City Officials to eliminate the careless fires, and to make the City of Tillamook as nearly fire proof as it is possible for a city to be with so many old shacks and fire traps. Today the Fire Marshals will study the city ordinances relative to fire hazards and fire safeguards, this will be succeeded by inspection of fire apparatus, water pressure, and inspection of public and business buildings. The deputies expect to tell the city frankly what is wrong and what is right. The expense of the survey is born by the state, and will cost the city nothing. The deputies state in regard to fire losses, that many say and feel that there is no loss because the insurance companies pay the loss. They fail to see the destruction of wealth, the blotting out or destroying of much property that can never be restored. It is out of the world, and represents so much effort and toil in the time, energy, and life of some man or men to say nothing of the destruction of things that were perhaps years and years in growing.

It is true the insurance companies pay many losses, reimbursing partly at least, the loss of the individual, but these companies have already collected for these in premiums paid them, or must do so afterwards. The premium is the measure of the hazard and must be increased by heavy losses, and go down as the losses decrease.

The property burned and so destroyed must be replaced with the money, time, work, and energy that otherwise would be used elsewhere in building or in adding to the possessions or wealth of the community. Think of the fact that one half at least of the value of all buildings erected in any one year are destroyed by fire during the year. Without this great loss and destruction there would remain not only the burned buildings, but the fire insurance premiums paid, and it would be interesting to know how much this would amount to in the saving of any community or country.

Some may obtain a temporary benefit by a fire when he is overinsured and gets more than his property is worth, but his neighbors and his community lose, and the world is just that much poorer by the loss of the burned property that is destroyed and lost forever.

Therefore, we ask the citizens of Tillamook to assist us in fighting the fire fiend, by eliminating carelessness and cultivating carefulness.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE CERTAIN STREETS IN TILLAMOOK CITY, OREGON.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, to all whom it may concern, that the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, deeming it expedient to improve the streets hereinafter described, did, on the 21st day of July, 1919, adopt a resolution for said improvement, which said resolution is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

RESOLUTION AND NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE CERTAIN STREETS IN TILLAMOOK CITY, OREGON.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, deems it expedient and hereby declares its intention to improve following streets in said City, to-wit:

Ninth Street, from the East line of Thayer's Addition to Tillamook City, Oregon, West to Stillwell Avenue; Tenth Street, from the East side of Thayer's Addition to Stillwell Avenue and from the West line of Lot 1 Block 3, Sunnymead Addition to Tillamook City West to Third Avenue West;

Eleventh Street from the East line of Thayer's Addition to Stillwell Avenue, and Twelfth Street, from the West side of First Avenue West to Stillwell Avenue, and from Stillwell Avenue to Third Avenue West.

70th Street East, from a point 70 feet South of Tenth Street to a point 125 feet North of the Easterly portion of 12th Street; Stillwell Avenue, from 9th Street South to the Easterly portion of 12th Street;

First Avenue West, and an extension thereof, from a point in the center of 9th Street (extended) South of 12th Street.

Second Avenue West, from a point 100 feet North of the center of 11th Street South to the center of 12th Street.

Third Avenue West, from the intersection of the center of 10th Street with 3rd Avenue West South and Southerly to the center of 12th Street, laying out and constructing a sewer along said portions of said streets, and from the point of the intersection of 12th Street sewer with the sewer to be constructed along the line of Third Avenue West, running in a Southerly direction to Trask River.

All of said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter, resolutions and ordinances of Tillamook City, and in accordance with the plans and specifications, and estimates of work therefor, made and prepared by the City Engineer of Tillamook City, Oregon, filed in the office of the City Recorder of said Tillamook City. All of said improvements to be made at the expense of the property, and all thereof adjacent thereto and specially benefited by said improvements within the limits of the district established and defined by this resolution.

Be it further resolved that the plans, specifications and estimates for the proposed improvements, so made and prepared by the City Engineer as aforesaid, the estimate of the probable total cost thereof being the sum of \$13,199.76, be and the same are hereby approved.

That the boundaries of the assessment district to be benefited by said improvements and assessed therefor are hereby established as follows: Beginning at the center of the east line of Block 49 of Thayer's Addition to Tillamook City, Oregon, and running thence North along the East line of said addition to a point in the center of the East line of Block 42 of said Addition; running thence West to a point 375 feet West of the West line of the North line of 9th Street (extended); thence South to a point 105 feet North of the North line of 10th Street; thence West to the West line (extended) of Norton's Addition to Tillamook City; thence South to the South line of Edrick Thomas Donation Land Claim; thence East along said South line of the Edrick Thomas Donation Land Claim to the Southwest corner of Lot 3 in Block 9 of Norton's Addition to Tillamook City; thence South to a point 105 feet South of the South line (extended) of the Easterly portion of 12th Street; thence East to the West line of the street or road leading South from Tillamook City; thence North to the North line of the Easterly portion of 12th Street; thence East to point South of the center line (extended) of Block 4 of Drew's Addition to Tillamook City; thence North to a point 105 feet South of the South line of 11th Street; thence East to the place of beginning.

That said assessment district shall be and is hereby designated as Local Improvement District No. 11, and the

All of Block's 1, 2, 3 and 4 of Sunnymead Addition to Tillamook City, except the North half of Lots 6 and 7 in Block 2;

Tract beginning at the Southwest corner of Block 2 of Sunnymead Addition to Tillamook City, and running thence North 105 feet; thence West to the West line (extended) of Norton's Addition to Tillamook City; thence South to the Northwest corner of Norton's Addition to Tillamook City, thence East to the northeast corner of Block 2 of said Norton's Addition to Tillamook City; thence South to the North line of 12th Street; thence East to the West line of 12th Street; thence North to the place of beginning.

Tract beginning at the Northwest corner of Block 3 of Sunnymead Addition to Tillamook City, and running thence West to the Northeast corner of Lot 1 in Block 3 of Norton's Addition to Tillamook City; thence South to the North line of 12th Street; thence East to the West line of Block 3 of Sunnymead Addition to Tillamook City; thence North to the place of beginning.

Tract bounded on the North by Block 3 of Drew's Addition to Tillamook City; on the South by Stillwell Avenue; on the East by 1st Avenue East, and on the South by 12th Street.

There is a strong sentiment in favor of the beach route by the business men of this city, and it is hoped by then the commission will favor that route. The County Court will also appear before the commission for the purpose of coming to an understanding about hardsurfacing roads in this county.
