In April, 1917, The Civic Improvement Club of Tillamook, with Mrs. Baker being out of the city. Stanley Coates as chairman, called a public meeting for the purpose of organizing a Red Cross, and Mrs. C. J. chairman, and Mrs. A. C. Everson Drew. temporary secretary.
