NEW \$25,000 SCHOOL VOTED.

Bonds to be Sold to Raise Sum For New Building for Bay City.

Bay City School District, No. 31, voted July 24th, with but a single dissenting vote to bond the district for \$25,000 for a new school building, which will most probably be a high school building. This provides for an educational development for Bay City that will be second to none, and shows foresight on the part of the district to look ahead to the training of its young men and women.

The building will be erected on the site of land purchased a few years ago above the railroad track past Provoost's.

\$560 Realized from Less Than Acre of Strawberries.

J. E. Provoost, of Bay City has just finished picking his strawberries. He had .31 of an acre in two, three and four-year-old plants, from which he gathered and sold to the local markets 160 crates at 24-pounds each for \$3 net per crate.

The Bay City Storage & Fisheries company has sold a half interest in their concern to Wassell and Helgren of Portland, and are arranging to install berry canning machinery here and will be in the market for evergreen blackberries this fall. It is estimated that the evergreen crop this year will be from 100,000 to 150,000 pounds.

Prices are not yet fixed, but will be approximately 8 cents to open the season. The berries grow mostly in the open country, and by the roadsides. They will bring in considerable pin money for the women and children.
