Phone Rates Take Real Jump By Yimminy.

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company has filed with the Public Service Commission tariffs covering rate increases now effective. The increases are principally in charges for residence phones, and are effective through Oregon. The company says the newest increases are necessitated. The Public Service Commission is expected to review the rates immediately. State and Portland city officials propose to fight the increase. The principal charges are as follows:

THE DUAL PURPOSE COW

Has the dual purpose cow a place in a strictly Dairy Community? The following article from, the Douglas Co. Farm Bureau News is well worth studying by Tillamook people.

Prof. G. E. Day, Guelph, Ont., says: "The man who would try to make a strictly dairy breed of the Shorthorn is wasting time and spoiling good material. The man who wishes to specialize in dairying should take a ready-made dairy breed, and not fool away his time spoiling a good beef breed. But there are many farmers in this and other countries who through circumstances, inclination or otherwise, cannot or do not wish to specialize in dairying, but they want a cow that will produce a fair amount of milk and raise a calf which can be developed into a first-class butcher's bullock. In other words, these men do not want a dairy cow, but they want a two-purpose or dual purpose cow, to supply the requirement of such men is legitimate business, and no breed will fill the bill so well as the Shorthorn, which has been noted for its milking qualities from its earliest history. Such noted Shorthorn breeders as Thomas Bates and Amos Cruickshank attached great importance to the milking qualities of their cows, and discarded many an otherwise good cow because it was unsatisfactory as a milker. A number of our leading Shorthorn breeders today, including William Duthie, share in the opinion of Bates and Cruickshank, and it has been demonstrated over and over again that a fairly heavy flow of milk is not antagonistic to beef production. To run after world records in milk production or to compete with the strictly dairy breeds is quite another question, and the man who attempts to do this with the Shorthorn is taking the Shorthorn out of out of its proper sphere and working a serious injury to the breed."
