HENRY FORD GAINS CONTROL OF FORD MOTOR WORKS AGAIN

Ford Representative Here Says Henry Has Purchased Practically All Stock in Big Factory.

According to W. H. Goldman, Ford representative, who was here Wednesday looking after Ford interests at the Ackley and Miller garage, Henry Ford has through his son, Edsel, manipulated the stock market until he owns practically the entire stock of the Ford Motor Works, of Michigan. This puts a stop to the talk of a new Ford motor car, for it was to have been put out by Henry and Edsel alone in a new factory entirely controlled by them.

Ford proposes now to divide his profits among his employees, instead of stockholders, Mr. Goldman said. A million cars is the proposed output for next year, or about 4000 a day. Over 1000 Fords are delivered to Oregon every month. A recent convention of Ford agents from every part of the country was held in Detroit and Ford announced his future plans as far as he knew them then.
