### SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN ALSO PLAYED POLITICS.

Russell Hawkins' Testimony in The Spruce Investigation at Portland

Near the end of the spruce investigation in Portland, Russell Hawkins, of the Whitney Co., was a witness and his evidence not only shows that ex-governor West, but senator Chamberlain, was also instrumental in having him removed, which goes to prove that West was not confining himself to the truth when he testified that he alone was responsible for Hawkins' removal.

It will be remembered that a delegation from Tillamook waited upon Colonel Disque and advised him that only a few miles from this city there is the largest and best body of spruce in the northwest. Amos Benson was sent to Tillamook and it was reported about the city that he said there was not sufficient timber there and Colonel Disque told Mr. Hawkins that he did not believe there was any appreciable amount of timber in the tract.

W. S. Cone, who cruised and located the timber some year ago, hearing what Benson is reported saying, took a mill man with him and went over the tract, for he could not understand why there should be so large a tract of spruce timber a few years ago and it amounted to very little now. It was to satisfy his own curiosity that he went over the timber again, and he came back with the report and reported that it was one of the best tracts of spruce in the United States. This goes to show how little the spruce division knew about standing spruce timber.

Following is the evidence in reference to Tillamook county and the part Russell Hawkins took.

N. E. Ayer, of the St. Johns Lumber Co. testified regarding the participation of his company in airplane stock production prior to the entrance of the United States, of his organization of the use of fir for wing-beams, and of the dictatorial manner in which his concern has been handled by Colonel Disque.

"Was there any question of the ability of the northwest loggers to furnish several times as much airplane lumber as was needed?" asked Representative Magee.

"I don't think there was any question about it," answered the witness. Narrating his own participation in the matter of spruce production, to which he was summoned as organizer for the northwest, in September, 1917, by Howard E. Coffin, director of aircraft, Russell Hawkins took up the thread of testimony.

He was asked relative to his displacement in the service, after Colonel Disque had been assigned to the northwest, why he had failed to get the commission which he had been urged to accept.

"I did not want a commission," said Mr. Hawkins. "I believed that men who aided in this work should not wear the uniform. But when I found that Senator Chamberlain objected to my appointment, I naturally wanted it."

About this time General Squires at Washington had telephoned to Colonel Disque, at Portland that "the secretary of war disapproves the commission of Hawkins on information of a senator."

Mr. Hawkins had called up Secretary Baker and had been assured that there had been senatorial objections lodged against his prospects for a commission.

"The secretary of war told me to go home and keep my mouth shut, and mind my own business, and be patriotic," smiled Mr. Hawkins.

engaged in spruce production organization, reading the list of suggestions and recommendations he had made to Director-General Coffin.

The Whitney Company possesses a tract of 186,000,000 feet of spruce in Tillamook county, testified the witness. After his removal from the service he desired to aid in spruce production and offered to log this tract if a 12 mile railroad extension were made to the timber. The freight rate quoted him, said the witness, was in excess of that paid on logs from Toledo to Portland.

"So I thought I'd try it again," laughed the witness "when I read that they needed 30,000,000 feet a month."

Thereupon he made Colonel Disque an offer to log the Tillamook tract at a cost plus one-tenth of 1 per cent basis, the fraction of profit to go to the Red Cross. Col. Disque thanked him for his generous offer, but said that he did not believe there was any appreciable amount of spruce in the tract. The deal fell through, though Mr. Hawkins appointed two cruisers to meet cruisers of the spruce production division, the four to recruise the tract.

"Why did you offer such a contract?" asked Representative Frear.

"Such a scandalous contract?" added Representative Magee, with a smile.

"I thought they wanted spruce," replied Mr. Hawkins. "I had a boy on a submarine. Money don't mean anything to our crowd."

"Did the cruisers go again to the tract?" asked the chairman.

"I don't know," answered the witness. "Our men were never called upon to go."

"While you were representing spruce production, did you pay your own expenses?" asked Representative Magee.

"Every cent of 'em," said Mr. Hawkins.

The witness testified that at the time he was removed from spruce service, neither he nor his company had any interest in northwest spruce logging, nor did they anticipate any.
