

**THE HOLSTEIN BREEDERS.**

**Have Pleasant and Interesting Meeting at Clay Daniels.**

There is no getting away from the fact that the Holstein breeders of Tillamook county are a live, progressive bunch, with the boosting spirit prevailing in all their undertakings—to promote the breeding of the Black and Whites. There is a fine spirit of co-operation one with the other in the Tillamook County Holstein Breeders' Association, with a large amount of intelligent information, free of charge, to the dairymen who want information on that type of dairy herd and pure bred Holstein sires to head their herds. The members of the association are up and coming all the time, and preaching the gospel of pure bred dairy stock, especially the Holstein. That is one reason why the Holstein breeders have made more progress than the Jersey and Guernsey Breeders Associations, but the pep the Black and White have put into their propaganda have aroused considerable interest amongst dairymen of other breeds, with the result that in future years there will be keen rivalry between the Holstein, Jersey and Guernsey breeders of Tillamook county. This is already manifest, now that it has dawned upon the dairymen of this county that the sire of a dairy herd, should be a pure bred, registered animal, and that all other sires are simply "scrubs" and that there are too many scrub bulls in the county.

The Holstein Breeders' Association meeting at Clay Daniels' on Saturday was another occasion when the breeders of the Black and White "swapped" ideas in an intelligent manner and were keen advocates of everything that would benefit and improve the dairy herds of Tillamook county, and to some extent this is the reason that every meeting that is held helps to swell the membership of the Holstein association. It brings about the some results of a man buying an auto—he immediately becomes a good road booster, even if he was a "knocker" previously.

**The Picnic Lunch.**

It was a fairly good sized meeting on Saturday, with a picnic lunch on the shady side of Clay Daniels house, which, of course, was one of the pleasing features of the day's enjoyment, served by the good wives of the dairymen, and they certainly know how to put up a most tempting lunch, which was greatly enjoyed by everybody present. All that need be added to this is the Holstein breeders are the most liberal providers and at the same time good feeders.

**Plea For New Members.**

After the "eats" the meeting was called to order by B. A. Folks, president of the Holstein Breeders' Association. The Secretary, Rollie W. Watson, read the correspondence from the national association, and reported \$174.49 in the treasury. He was instructed to draw a warrant to pay the special prizes that the association offered at the county fair. Mr. Watson made a strong plea that a propaganda be carried on to obtain new members, for he contended that all those who favored the Holstein breed should belong to the association, the fee for which was only \$2 a year. He predicted that in ten years the dairymen of the county would be receiving more money from pure bred stock than they were from cheese.

**Cattle Exhibit at Fair.**

Mr. Folks said the Association was fortunate in having such a fine exhibit at the county fair. He had been told that no better stock was exhibited at the state fair, and that Tillamook county fair was far ahead of fairs in other counties in that respect. He said the association would be glad to help dairymen make their selection in purchasing blooded stock for in that manner they could help one another. During this discussion it was remarked that "if it hadn't been for the Holstein and other breeding associations the county fair wouldn't have amounted to much this year." Later in the day the president of the association, said he believed that the county fair would eventually become a dairy and stock show, and that thousands of dollars in prizes would be offered by the National Holstein Association.

**Tillamook Highest in State Cow Testing Report.**

The monthly cow testing report of the O. A. C. was read and discussed. It showed that 4529 cows in the state had been tested, and out of that number 2144 were in Tillamook county—Tillamook No. 1 with 1440 head and Nestucca, with 704. The herd having the highest average production was that of Jay Honey (Holstein) with 57.48 average fat. In the high cows for the state for fat and milk production, Tillamook county was highest in both. Josi Bros. (G Jersey) was highest in fat production, with 1878 pounds of milk and 129.58 pounds of fat, and in milk production C. N. Gilmore (R Holstein) had 2486 pounds of milk and 89.01 pounds of fat.

**Favors Buying Fair Records.**  
County Agriculturist Jones touched upon the great improvement of stock and repeated some complimentary remarks made by the judges, and thought that some improvements could and should be made in the milking conditions for the next fair by the different associations. Mr.

Jones stated that he would be in charge of the county exhibit at the state fair and requested the assistance of those who had garden truck or other things. He made a strong plea in favor of the county owning its own fair grounds, and that sufficient money be placed in the next budget for that purpose. This met with general approval, with the exception of E. K. Scovell, who raised some objections, but not of a very serious nature. This led up to the introduction of a resolution in which the Holstein Breeders' Association went on record in favor of the county owning its own fair grounds and would back up the county court at the budget meeting in purchasing the 40 acres of land on which it has an option.

**Only Two Kinds of Sires.**

Dolph Tinnerstet, the dairy inspector, said in his travels over the county inspecting barns and dairy farms, he visited also farms in Clatsop, Yamhill and Polk counties, which convinced him that dairy farms of Tillamook county were in far better sanitary conditions than the dairy farms in the three adjoining counties. He said that the dairymen belonging to different breeding associations were the ones who kept their farms and herds in good sanitary condition, and who carefully looked after their stock. In the discussion of pure bred sires, Mr. Tinnerstet took the position that there were only two classes of sires—registered and the "scrub". This brought out the question of bulls, especially scrub bulls, running at large with the object in view of having a bill passed at the next session of the state legislature, the Holstein Association being anxious to co-operate with the other breeders associations in bringing this about.

**Tuberculosis Almost Stamped Out.**

Dr. Glaisyer gave some valuable information, and it was brought out as a result of the efforts to rid Tillamook county dairy herds of tuberculosis, it was reduced to one animal in 1000, and it was the object to make Tillamook county a disease free area for tuberculosis in dairy cattle, which is, certainly, a very commendable and gratifying record.

At the invitation of Dr. Reedy the association will meet in November at the Cattle Exchange.

The editorial in the Headlight in regard to cattle running at large was favorably commented upon, and by a vote of the association the editor was thanked for generous space and reports he had given the association and with a vote of thanks to the ladies for the lunch, brought a pleasant afternoon to a close.

Mr. Daniels has some fine looking Holstein animals on his farm, which the visitors inspected. It was his intention to send some of them to the state fair. Mr. and Mrs. Daniels did everything possible to make the visitors welcome and at home.
