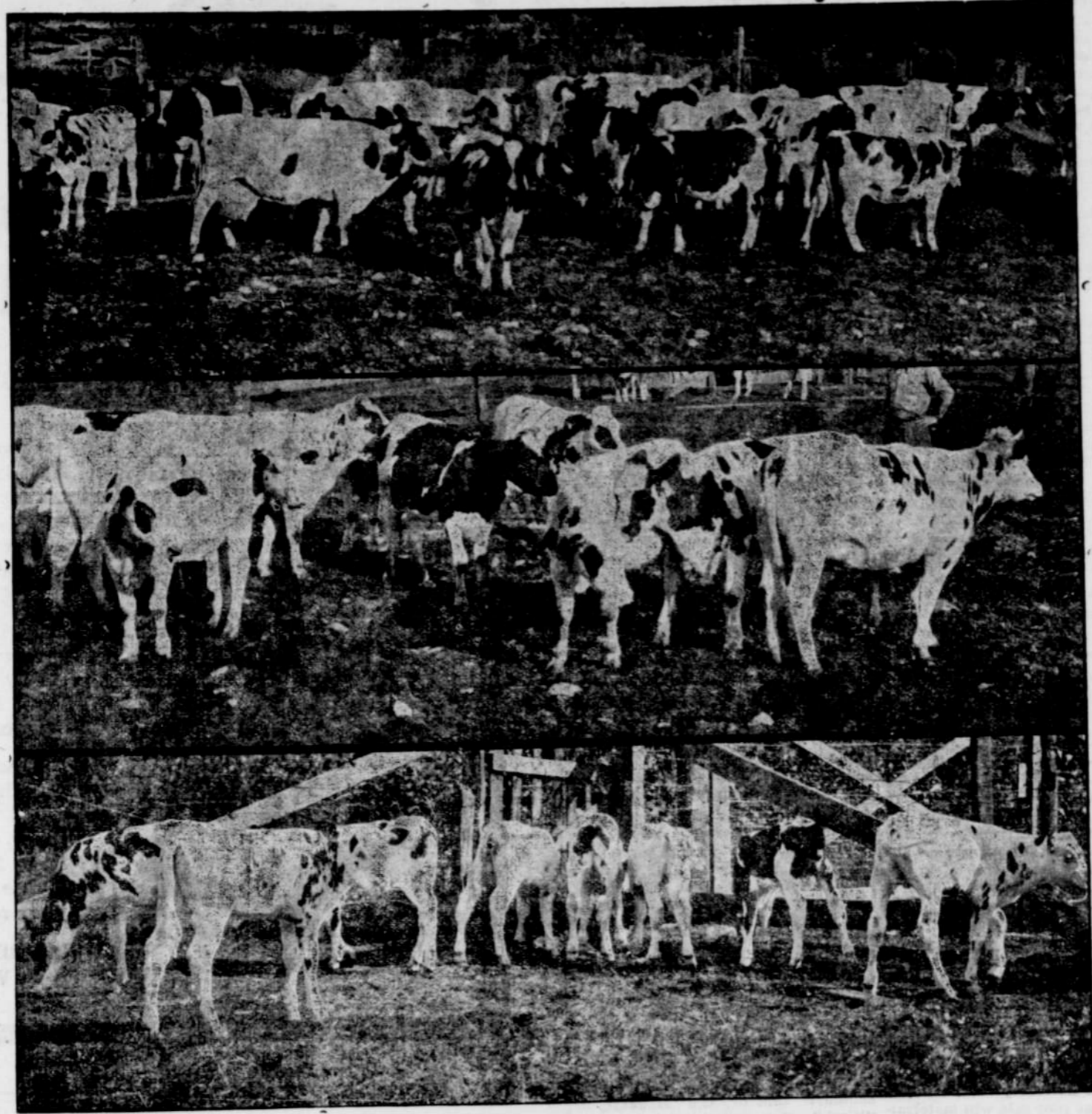
Name of His Mansion.
