But Drab in Practice.

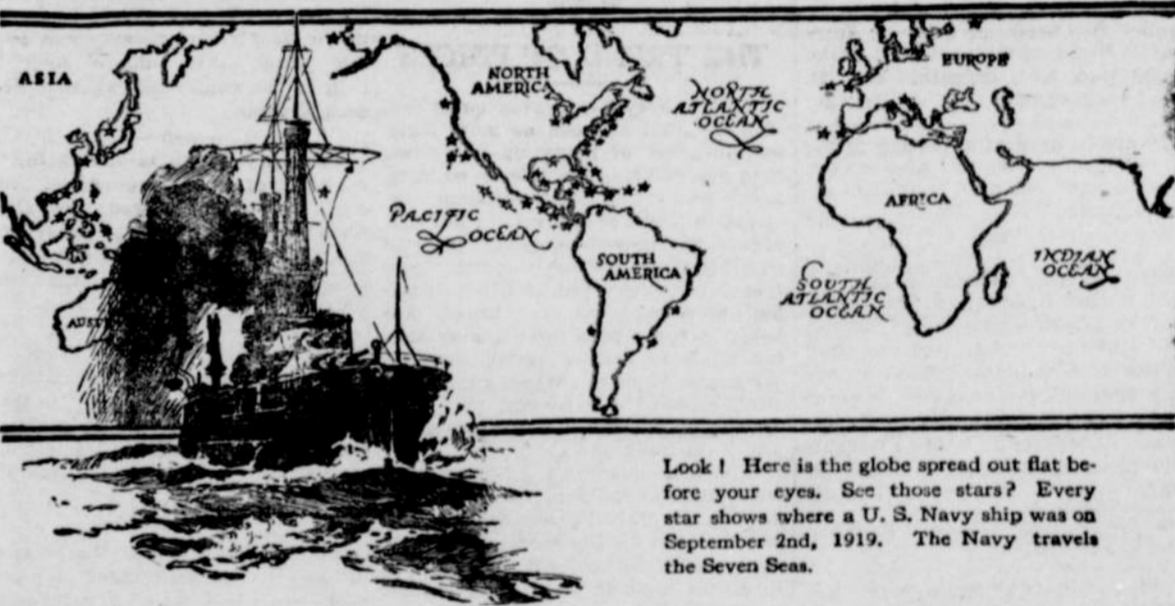
