Circuit Court Still in Session.

The October term of the Circuit court is still in session, and from all appearance it will take a week or more to get through with the jury cases. The grand jury was in session the first of the week and returned two secret indictments.

The cases disposed of since our last issue are as follows.

Juliette Davey vs. Scott Bozorth, et al. Action for money. Verdict in favor of plaintiff, damages issued against Scott Bozorth for \$453.75.

Davis Bourneville Company vs. L. Hiner and L. Reed. Action for money. Upon direction of Court verdict returned in favor of plaintiff for \$103.36.

Fred Bohmer vs. F. L. Braden and A. A. Yager. Action for money. Judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$96.95 each against the defendants.

Grace O'Neil vs. Elsie Vidito. Damages. Dismissed as plaintiff failed to appear.

Fred C. Skomp vs. Charles Elliott. Action for money. Lionel Smith being a material witness was ordered to attend court and give testimony.

The J. E. Martin Co. vs. Silver Spruce Co. Action for money. Verdict for plaintiff for \$110.47.

Harry J. Foster vs. Dorothy Foster.

Divorce. Default and plaintiff granted divorce.

Clyde Hudson vs. Lela Hudson. Divorce. Decree given and plaintiff given charge of child.

A. B. Freberg vs. Rose Jacob and Barnhardt Jacob. To reform deed. Suit dismissed against all defendants except Barnhardt Jacob and wife.

The criminal case against William Smith, who was indicted for setting out fire and which was alleged caused the great forest fire in September of last year and destroyed and swept through a large section of timber on the Wilson river, was tried last Saturday, taking the whole day.

The most damaging evidence against the defendant was given by William Ryan, and Mrs. Ryan, who testified that Smith had admitted to them he had set out fire and it had got away from him burning the Rehner house, and he hoped that Mr. Rehner would not sue him for damages. The prosecution also produced witnesses who testified that the fire started from the Smith place and then spread out.

Smith claimed that there was considerable fire in that vicinity and he had endeavored to quench the same by throwing dirt on it and that he had no malicious intent in setting out fire. The jury however, brought in a verdict of not guilty.

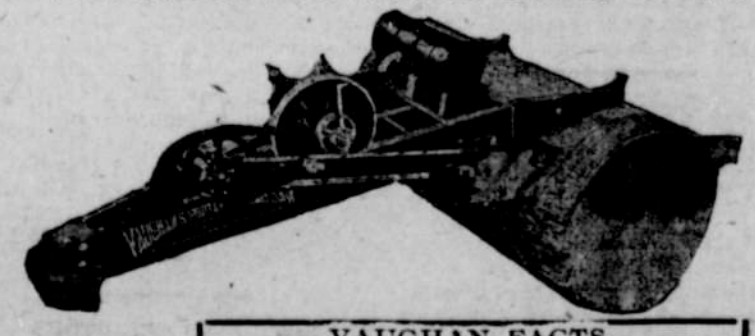
The first of the condemnation suits that of Elmer D. Hall, Frank Johnson, et al, was commenced on Wednesday morning, and it is expected will be finished today.
