RED CROSS MEMBERSHIP ROLL CALL.

Tillamook County Being Organized for Drive, Which Starts Next Week.

The Red Cross Membership Roll Call will start next Sunday in Tillamook County, and it is hoped that every adult in the county will enroll their names in this national organization, which did so much good in all parts of the world during the war period. Each school district will be organized and a local committee selected, assisted by the teachers. Here in Tillamook City, which is school district No. 9, the American Legion, kindly consented to take an active part.

Fred C. Baker, the newly elected president of the Tillamook County chapter of the American Red Cross, as well as the executive board, would like to see every adult person become a member of the local chapter of the Red Cross, and as the people of Tillamook County were so patriotic and hard workers during the war, Mr. Baker confidently hopes that the people will back up the Red Cross in the future and that Tillamook County, considering its size, will have an exceedingly large percentage of members. For the information of the public, we can say that no more drives will be made for money by the Red Cross, with the exception of the annual membership drive, and all that is asked of a person is \$1.00 to carry on the work of this great and commendable organization. Fifty cents of that amount will remain in the funds of Tillamook county Chapter, which will be used for home service work amongst service men and other benevolent purposes in cases of emergency. The disbursement of the Red Cross funds is in the hands of the executive board, composed of seven members, and should anything of importance come up where a large amount of money is to be used for any one purpose a meeting of the members will be called to decide the matter.

Mr. Baker feels he has appealed to the people of Tillamook County for funds a good many times for different purposes, but this is one of the most important, and for that reason he makes a special request at this time that the people of each school district will do their best to create interest and obtain as many members as possible. It is the intention to compile a list of the Red Cross members as soon after the membership roll call is over as possible. This will be done in alphabetical form by school districts, as it is important to know who are and who are not members of the Red Cross in Tillamook county, a copy of which will be sent to each school district and the entire list published in the newspapers. It takes only a dollar to have a person's name on this roll of honor. As will be seen by an article in this issue the Junior Red Cross will have a drive for membership apart from this drive. There was some little misunderstanding last year, and to make it plain the Red Cross Membership Roll Call is for adults and the Junior Red Cross drive is for the children.

One of the features in Tillamook County on Armistice Day, November 11, is that every adult person should wear a Red Cross button on that day.

Should anyone wish to give more than \$1.00 to the Red Cross they can do so in two ways. First, by taking out more memberships, and, second, in taking out one membership and donating the remainder to the Red Cross, and in the latter case the balance of the money would go into the funds of the local chapter.

American Legion to Help in Red Cross Membership Drive.

Tillamook Post, No. 47, of the American Legion, voted unanimously last Friday evening to assist the local chapter of the Red Cross in its membership drive, which is to open next week. Support of the

movement was requested by F. C. Baker, chairman, and R. H. McGrath, secretary of the chapter.

Many other questions of public interest were discussed during the meeting. The ex-service men expressed themselves as favoring a small standing army backed by an efficient National Guard. They favor temporary restriction of all immigration and believe that strict naturalization laws should be adopted and enforced. In their opinion, aliens should be required to apply for naturalization within a limited time after their arrival or forfeit their right to become citizens.

Foreign language newspapers received considerable attention and a majority of the members present favored their abolition. A larger majority believed that if permitted, such newspapers should be required to publish translations in English of all matters printed in the foreign tongue. This, it was suggested, would assist foreigners in learning the English language.

The local post has acquired the use of the old Commercial Club rooms in the Tillamook block and will make its headquarters there during the winter months. Election of permanent officers of the Post is scheduled for Friday evening, November 7th.

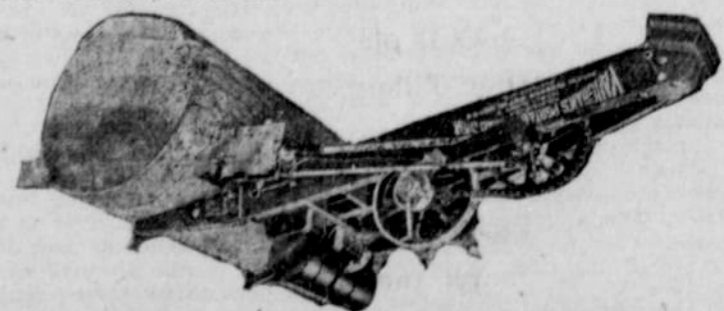
