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Editorial Snap Shots.

It is a little surprising how I. W. W.-ism have taken such hold and the large number of native born Americans citizens who have become contaminated with it. Of the 15 I. W. W.'s arrested in Tillamook county on Saturday 10 were native born.

Let's hope President Wilson won't butt in and save the lives of the assassins who shot down in cold blood members of the American Legion at Centralia, the same has he did in the California outrage, saving the life of Mooney, one of the perpetrators of that horrible crime.

That's another proof that Tillamook got a rotten deal at the state fair. With the same batch of cheese which didn't get a show at the state fair, Tillamook county secured the first six prizes and a tie for seventh at the Pacific International Livestock Exhibition at Portland this week.

It is no doubt wise on the government's part to establish a naval and military base at Tongues Point on the Columbia river, but to make it a success it must have a coast road, and this is another reason why the Roosevelt Military Highway should be built as soon as possible, for there is no telling in these troubled times when it will be needed.

It is freely stated that the dollar buys only half what it used to. Instead of everybody being twice as thrifty as in former years, the reverse appears to be the case. Workingmen with big wages blow in all their wages, with the idea that big wages will continue. It may be a long time before wages are reduced to pre-war times, but they cannot remain at the high water mark much longer.

Since the advent of the railroad and the government control of the railroad, well we all get "stung" about double what we used to pay for freight, and we don't say a word or raise a howl, but pay the bill. Somehow they were good old days after all.

From newspaper reports the unemployed labor situation in Portland is growing serious, it being reported that there are 3,000 service men out of jobs in that city. With the high cost of living these men cannot remain idle long, and should they do so it will lead to considerable complaint and probably disturbance, equally share the expenses.

hence every effort should be made to give these men work this winter, especially the service men.

It was Os West, when Governor of Oregon, who fathered the measure to abolish capital punishment in Oregon and if the outrage that occurred at Centralia had happened in Oregon, no matter how many members of the American Legion the I. W. W.'s shot down, they could not be hanged in this state. West was a spectacular governor, always playing to the galleries. West is eliminated politically and it is about time that Oregon resorted to capital punishment again.

President Wilson said that the league of nations covenant would have to be accepted by the senate exactly as he brought it from France, but he now finds that he cannot bulldoze Republican senators the same as he bulldozed the Democratic senators. The Republican senators now present a solid front and Mr. Wilson now realizes that he is not "It" any longer. The Republican senators having agreed on certain reservations it is expected that the Senate will take a final vote this week, with the threat from the president that he will pigeonhole the treaty and league covenant if the senators refuse to do what he is now declaring. Maybe, it would be a good thing for the United States if he did pigeonhole them.

The investigations into the deplorable manner in which the government conducted the war is opening the eyes of the people. The article we published in the two last issues of the Headlight in regard to the deplorable muddle of the airplane production is only one out of many instances of the wilful waste of public money. It is stated in the article that two billion dollars were appropriated for aeroplanes, and the whole thing was a colossal failure from a military standpoint. No wonder that the people are thoroughly disgusted with the Democratic administration and are anxious to hurl it from power the first opportunity. One year from now will see this accomplished, the Republicans sweeping the entire country with the solid Democratic vote in the South a thing of the past.

Local Roosevelt Military Highway boosters have under consideration the matter of sending a delegation to Washington to advocate the passage of Congressman W. C. Hawley's bill for \$2,500,000, for the Roosevelt highway, H. H. Rosenberg having received a letter from the treasurer of Lincoln county requesting that the coast counties send one or more persons to Washington. A telegram was sent to Congressman Hawley on Monday to ascertain whether this was advisable and when would be the best time for a delegation to be in Washington. The local committee feel confident that congress will pass the bill, as the government has decided to establish a naval base at Tongues Point on the Columbia river, and to make that a success, it will require a military road through the coast counties. Should a delegation be sent to Washington it is expected that all the coast counties will co-operate and equally share the expenses.

Where's the difference, anyway? Eammon de Valera, the chosen president of the Sinn Feiners, of Ireland, is making speeches in the United States and was in Portland last week, and the fact seems to have been overlooked that the Sinn Feiners were in sympathy with Germany during the war, and when conscription was proposed for Ireland the Sinn Feiners revolted and were not conscripted the same as men in the United States and England. So, to our way of thinking, there is no difference between Sinn Feiners and pro-German, for both hoped that Germany would lick the allies and that the kaiser would become the military dictator of the whole world. The point we want to bring out, however, is this: The government has allowed anarchists from Europe to sow the seeds of sedition in the United States, and we have been witnessing the past few years many blood thirsty plots, such as the Mooney outrage in California and the outrage at Centralia last week, which is the result of allowing the United States to become the dumping ground for anarchists and blood thirsty assassins from Europe, and allowing them to use inflammable language against foreign governments and against the government of the United States. As the Sinn Feiners were a pro-German party during the war, and were simply cowardly "slackers", protesting against being conscripted, we think the American Legion have just cause to be highly indignant when the president of the Irish slackers is allowed to address meetings in large cities and use the stars and stripes and the national anthem. As long as this is permitted and foreign political agitators, anarchists and assassins can stump the country, trouble and murder will continue in the United States.
