Prize Winners at the Livestock Exposition.

The Pacific International Livestock Exposition just finished in Portland has in a great many ways been a remarkable event for Tillamook County. We, of course, knew that we could walk out with the top places with the cheese but a great many did not realize that we could step in with our pure bred cattle and come out near the top and in some instances on top.

The pure bred industry in this county is only in its infancy and it speaks well for our judgment in selling and developing our foundation stock so it will go to a show of this caliber and win out. It is no disgrace to go down to the lower places when you are up against such herds as the Hollywood Carnation and William Bishop in the Holsteins, Waikiki Stump Loughary and Cary in the Jerseys, and Jean De Luth, Caribou, and Chitona Farms in the Guernseys. Many classes had over 20 animals and as there was only 10 moneys it was some honor to even get in to the money. Very few Tillamook animals were left outside the money. The Victory and Holstein classes were supreme as Countess of Sunnyside De Kol 2nd, owned by J. J. Rupp, was pronounced Grand Champion female of the show. Mr. Rupp entered this cow in the sale and she sold to Mr. Harrison, of Seattle, for the sum of \$2,100.00. Judge Moscrip declared that this cow showed up the best of any dairy cow that he had ever handled.

The Jersey men also have cause for elation, as they took two blue ribbons and were well up in the money in nearly every class. The older breeders will have to look out for their laurels as Edwin Glad with a school club calf, Gambog's Gay Ann, won 1st place in the school club division and 5th place in the open class of 20 head. The calf clubs are a thing which the breeders of this county will do well to emphasize and they will have to get busy if they keep ahead of the boys with the club calf.

The show was pronounced by those who should know, as the greatest live stock show that was ever held on the Pacific Coast. Every Tillamook breeder who exhibited received his money's worth in ideas and knowledge gain, to say nothing of the advertising which our county has obtained.

Notice is hereby given, that a special school meeting of School District No. 9, of Tillamook County, Oregon, will be held at the school house in said district on the 19th day of December 1919, at the hour of 2 o'clock p.m., for the following purposes:
1st. To authorize the school board of the said district to purchase for a school site the following described tract of land situated in Tillamook City, Tillamook County, Oregon, to-wit:
Beginning at a point 1775.5 feet south and 570 feet west of the northeast corner of the Edrick Thomas D. L. Claim and running thence south 620 feet; thence west 209 feet; thence south 209 feet; thence west 271 feet; thence north 829.8 feet; thence east 480 feet to the place of beginning, less tract beginning at the northeast corner of said tract and running thence west 240 feet; thence south 235.5 feet; thence east 240 feet; thence north 235.5 feet to the place of beginning.
Also beginning at a point 2386.3 feet south and 570 feet west of the northeast corner of said Thomas D. L.
