THE LIVE STOCK SHOW WAS A GREAT SUCCESS.

Tillamook County Breeders Win Many Prizes.

The Pacific International Livestock Exposition which was held in Portland from Nov. 17th to 22nd, has passed into history. It was a wonderful show in every respect. In fact the "old timers" who have been in attendance for years at the great "International" at Chicago, state that the show of stock at Portland excelled in many particulars the world's greatest stock show held in the east. The stock breeders of the west are setting a pace, have set a pace rather at this 1919 show that is going to keep them very much "alive" in 1920 to excel; yet this will be accomplished, for plans are now being made by all to bring out their prize animals at the exposition next year.

Tillamook Has Many Prize Animals.
It was indeed gratifying that so many of the Tillamook exhibitors were awarded prizes—and most all of the breeders entering stock got into the line somewhere. The competition was strong as in some of the classes there were as many as sixteen entered for places. The very first seven animals were awarded six prizes. This quite naturally made the Tillamook bunch very happy. There were forty-six head entered from Tillamook which were represented in the Holstein, Jersey and Guernsey Breeds. The 1st prize, champion and grand champion aged cow prize was awarded to "Countess of Sunnyside DeKol 2nd," which belonged to Jack Rupp. This cow was one of the greatest attractions of the Holstein show at the exposition and was entered in competition with the greatest show animals of the Hollywood, Carnation and Bishop stock farms of Washington. "Countess" was sold to Mr. C. A. Harrison, of Seattle, for \$2,100.00.

Exposition Building And Grounds.

The exposition building and grounds are located between the Union Stock Yards and the Interstate bridge across the Columbia river, in North Portland. The building covers approximately seven acres and the grounds embraces seventeen acres which were deeded by the stock yard company to the Pacific International Live Stock Exposition company. The officers of the company are composed of the leading stock men and business men of the Pacific Coast, who have made it possible to own and control such a magnificent property and show place for exhibition purposes. Mr. O. M. Plummer, through his untiring and indomitable energy has worked night and day ever since the project was started to realize this final achievement of success; and to him the greatest of credit should be given in putting the finishing touches to the enterprise. The grounds will be further improved and the completion of building in many little details before the next stock show in 1920. Transportation and accommodation for every body will be greatly improved; although it is authoritatively stated that over 75,000 people were in attendance during the week of the show, there was no friction evident, everybody was exceedingly happy, pleasant and accommodating and at one time there were over 12,000 people in the auditorium.

Many Tillamook People at the Show.

Tillamook was well represented, there probably being over one hundred of our people at the exposition besides those who had stock on exhibition. It would be impossible at this time to give a complete list of all our people who were there. All expressed their surprise at the magnitude of the show, and are thoroughly interested in the future of the pure bred live stock industry, especially for Tillamook County, and it is suggested by many that we should "sit up and take notice" and plan now for greater things in the future for Tillamook along the line of advancing in the production of pure bred stock. It is also suggested that a movement be started at this time, to build a large exposition building on the fair grounds to suit our needs and along the same lines as the building at the Pacific International. The stock and herdsman returned to Tillamook on Wednesday and are taking their animals back to their respective farms. Mr. Clay Daniel, who had his two prize heifers at the show were brought through to Tillamook city as the train did not stop at Mohler to let him off with his stock. Mr. Beals purchased a valuable Hollywood cow for \$1,400 at the sale. Mr. Folks added four head of beauties to his pure bred herd of Holsteins. Several other purchases were made or being considered by Tillamook breeders for the future advancement of their herds.

Tillamook Cheese Wins.

Our famous product scored for the first six prizes at the Western Dairy Product Exhibit. In fact out of 32 entries Tillamook cheese took all places from one to six and tied for the seventh place which is as it should be as there is no better cheese. One of the gaudiest signs in the dairy barns was the banner over the Tillamook County Holstein exhibit. This sign was 60 by 6 feet painted in large letters which could be seen as soon as you entered the barn as follows: "Tillamook County for the

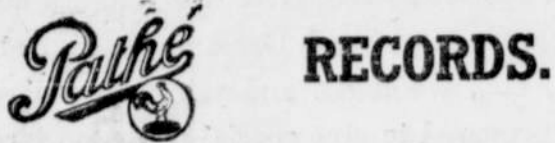
