In response to a number of requests from prospective students the school board has decided to open a night school in the High School building. For the present classes in stenography and typewriting will be offered and other commercial courses will be organized, if enough desire such work. A fee, payable in advance of \$2.50 per month, will be charged to cover expenses. Classes will be held on Monday and Wednesday evenings beginning Monday, Dec. 1st. Anyone interested may secure further information by calling at the High School or telephoning 150.

The county budget for 1920 calls for \$5000.00 for a fair grounds, and there appears to be some dairymen and breeders who would like to see that amount doubled. They contend that about the land is bought there will not be sufficient money for necessary improvements. We are anxious to see the county own its own fair grounds and the building of a stock pavilion, and, probably, if the different breeders' associations would confer with the county court or attend the budget meeting another \$5000.00 could be added to the amount provided in the budget. There is this much to be said in building a pavilion next year, and that is the high cost of building materials. For that reason it may be wise to delay the building of the pavilion and first get the grounds laid out in the most artistic manner. The different breeders' associations should get together and offer some suggestions whether the \$5,000 is sufficient or whether it should be increased to \$10,000.

Obituary.

May Donaldson was born near Tillamook, Oregon, Feb. 25, 1876. She grew to womanhood in the locality of her birth and received her education in the Fairview school. She became a teacher and taught in the county schools a few years.

She was married to Rev. R. Y. Blalock, who was pastor of Cloverdale Baptist church at that time. She professed religion while in girlhood, and soon after her marriage she joined the Baptist church and lived a constant Christian life until her death, which took place at her home in Cloverdale, Nov. 21st, 1919. At the time of her death she was 43 years, 8 months and 26 days old. She leaves her husband and six children, besides many other relatives and friends to mourn her loss.

She was ready to go. She said she felt that Jesus was with her and would carry her over the river. She was so anxious that her children should trust in Jesus and meet her in heaven. Her last word was "children."

Dear mother is now gone. She cannot come back to the children but they can go to her. Mamma has left us dear children and is going to be with Jesus. She said to meet her in heaven. We cannot say goodbye to mamma any more here, but we can do as she said, "trust in Jesus" and meet here there where there will be no goodbys.
