oughly recommend teachers' cottages as a solution for this problem and make every possible effort to influence school boards and patrons in that direction.

Fifth—Whereas, we have found the teachers have not always carefully observed their "code of ethics," first, in withdrawing applications in other places as soon as accepting a position second, in competitive bidding for positions; be it resolved that we teachers of Tillamook County be more punctilious in observing the Code of Ethics.

Sixth—Resolved that we heartily support a general school exhibit at the next county fair, in place of the individual school booths, thereby giving each school in the county an opportunity for exhibition that other wise might not be available.

Seventh—Whereas, we have found that the health program advocated for the schools to be of incalculable value and that interscholastic games and track meets do much to further its program; therefore be it resolved that we give all possible support and encouragement to these subjects.

Eighth—Whereas, the Tillamook City teachers have extended to us every courtesy, therefore be it resolved that we express to them our thanks for their generous hospitality.

Eighth—Whereas, we, the teachers of Tillamook County in Annual Institute assembled, have found, during the session, much inspiration and helpful guidance from the splendid program provided by our County Superintendent, therefore, be it resolved that we tender to him and to the instructors, our grateful appreciation of the professional enthusiasm with which this institute has been conducted.

Tenth—In order that the sentiments of the Teachers of Tillamook county may in some measure be made known in other sections of our state, be it resolved that the Secretary be instructed to send copies of these resolutions to the leading county and State papers and to the "Oregon Teachers' Monthly."

The Principals Club was organized by the election of P. H. Wyman as president and L. H. Bennett as secretary and treasurer.

About one hundred teachers were in attendance at the institute. It was full of enthusiasm, and many teachers were heard to remark, "What a good institute."

Pres J. H. Ackerman, of the Monmouth Normal, could not be present on account of the serious illness of one of his instructors and the Registrar of that institution.

H. S. Brimhall extended a cordial invitation to the teachers of the county to attend the dedication of the new school building in Nehalem on December 6th.
