County Judge A. M. Hare and County Commissioners Farmer and Alley are in Portland this week on business in connection with the county.

Merrill Smith, W. F. Baker and W. Foster left on Tuesday for Hillsboro, where they took the civil service examination for postmaster of Tillamook.

Antone Weiss brought suit in the justice court against Julius Erickson on a slashing contract. Weiss sued for \$70.00 and the jury awarded him a verdict of \$50.00.

W. A. Lewis vs. Karl Wilhelm is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover several sums of money for merchandise furnished the defendant amounting, in all to \$217.00.

The 1919 tax rolls will be turned over to the sheriff shortly and it is expected that along about the first week in February the sheriff will commence collecting taxes.

The spelling contest that was discontinued last year in the district schools owing to the "flu", will be resumed this year, the first of which will take place on Friday, January 16.

The fine weather of the past few weeks is a blessing to Tillamook county, for it has kept the roads, which have been torn up for hard-surfacing, in good condition for travel.

J. William Gilman vs. Alexander Watt is a suit filed in the circuit court in which plaintiff claims that the defendant took possession of certain articles converting them to his own use, claiming \$100.00.

J. A. Parker sold his business here, left Thursday morning for Forest Grove, where his family resides. He expects to be back again at some future date, for he considers that this is a fine business city.

H. L. Provoost and son Clarence were in the city Monday, having closed a deal for the purchase of the 27 acres of land belonging to Victor Holden, near Bay City, which they intend to put into loganberries in the near future.

All persons owning dogs in the county, and cities as well, must procure a dog license from the County Clerk and the dog must wear the dog collar furnished by the county. The license fee is \$1.00 for a male and \$2.00 for a female.

F. C. Esch, who had charge of the C. Penny store at Dallas was in the city the first of the week, when he made arrangements for fixing up the Roseberg building, where the company will start a new store in the near future.

R. Y. Rowland vs. A. C. Browning is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$131.00, growing out of a contract to slash, clear and improve an acre of land belonging to the defendant at \$20.00 per acre, the amount sued for being the balance owing the plaintiff.

After more than two weeks of bright sunny weather, with frosty nights, rain made its appearance again on Wednesday. There is something remarkable about the weather this year, for up to the present time there have been no northwest rain and wind storms.

There is a strong probability that the Seaside-Nehalem road will be opened this spring and summer, the work being done by co-operation between the State Highway Commission and Clatsop county. Wheeler reporter. Clatsop county has appropriated \$20,000 for this work.

The annual stockholders' meetings of the Alder Vale Creamery and the Red Clover Creamery were held during this week. At Alder Vale, which is the only purely cooperative asso-

ciation within the county, all of the officers of last year were elected. Some discussion of proposed improvements in the factory was had and an assessment was ordered levied to pay for new equipment to be purchased.

M. Abplanalp, G. Wyss, and Virgil Donaldson were re-elected directors of the Red Clover factory. No change was made in other officers. Some discussion was had relative to the method of paying for milk delivered to the factory and it was determined that the "6 plus" method be followed for half the year and the old method the balance. The board of directors is to determine when the change is to be made.

The annual meeting of the share holders of the First National Bank was held on Tuesday, Jan. 13. The directors elected for the ensuing year are as follows: C. J. Edwards, C. A. McGhee, B. C. Lamb, John Morrison, A. W. Bunn, Henry Rogers, Gust Wicklund and W. J. Reichers. The bank reports a very prosperous year, which is evidenced by deposits of over one million dollars and capital and surplus of \$75,000.00.

The annual meeting of the South Prairie National Farm Loan Association was held on Tuesday, when the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Directors, John Schild, Chas. Wells, Clyde Kinnaman, E. J. Gienger, Carl Possetti and E. L. Robertson, secretary-treasurer, W. J. Reichers. To give some idea as to the amount of government money that is loaned through this association, it amounts to \$433,000.

The Shakespeare club met at the home of Mrs. F. C. Baker, January 9, 1920. The afternoon was spent in reading the last two acts of "Merry Wives of Windsor." The annual meeting of the Holstein Breeders' Association will be held in Tillamook City next Monday, and it is hoped, that all black and white breeders will attend the meeting and become members of the association, as Tillamook county is destined to become a great center for registered dairy stock. The Jersey and Guernsey men are likewise greatly interested and the three breeders' associations are working together to bring this about.

The Ladies' Aid Society of the Methodist Church met in the regular session at the home of Mrs. Robt. McGrath. The assisting hostesses were Mrs. Paul and Mrs. Martin, a most refreshing luncheon was served. Twenty five members were present and two new members joined. The invited guests were Mrs. Dyrland, Mrs. Kuratli, Mrs. Leslie and Mrs. Hoffman. The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. W. E. Noyes, Jan. 22nd.

George Watt was in the city on Monday and he informed us that the Brighton saw mill started up the first of the week after being shut down for a month, owing to the car shortage. The new shingle mill company that was incorporated last week will erect its mill at Watseco, on Garibaldi beach, which, it is expected, will be in operation in about sixty days. A number of the employees of the Brighton Mills Co. have taken stock in the shingle mill.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Sercy, from Tillamook, were visitors on January 7th at the big exhibition of Southern California products maintained free to the public in the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce. They also attended the lectures and moving pictures that are a part of the daily program. The exhibition is the largest of any in the country maintained by a commercial organization. Before returning home, they expect to visit several of the many other places of interest in the southland.

The annual meeting of the Tillamook County Bank was held this week, when the following officers were elected: President, R. E. Williams; vice-presidents, H. T. Botts and David Kuratli; Cashier, C. Dyrland; assistant cashier, B. L. Beals, Jr.; directors, R. E. Williams, H. T. Botts, David Kuratli, T. W. Lyster, James Williams, John Erickson, Wm. Maxwell, D. Fitzpatrick and Albert Marolf. Under the new management with experienced bankers at its head this bank is making considerable progress.

The Tillamook Lumber Co. is the name of a new corporation just organized for the purpose of manufacturing lumber, with a capital stock of \$50,000 C. Foelkner, of Aberdeen, Washington, and O. A. Schultz, of this city, are the incorporators. The company has taken over the timber holdings of the Miami Lumber Co., which comprise about sixty million feet of spruce. The new saw mill with a capacity of 50,000 daily, will be erected on the railroad between the

Kilchis and Wilson rivers. It is expected that the mill will be completed and in operation by April 1st.

Joseph Woerndle vs. John Maginnis and wife and J. C. Ainsworth and wife is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$5000.00 on a promissory note. The complaint alleges that the first named defendants borrowed from G. E. Pottratz, the above amount and they delivered to the plaintiff a mortgage on certain property in Tillamook county. The conditions not having been complied with, plaintiff asks that the property be sold by the sheriff and if it fails to bring sufficient money to pay off the promissory note, a deficiency judgment be issued against the defendant Maginnis.

Joseph Duncan vs. Lizzie W. Duncan is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married in Tillamook county on the 14th of July, 1919, and the plaintiff alleged that during their entire married life, except the first few weeks, defendant treated plaintiff in a cruel and inhuman manner and has heaped personal indignation upon him; the defendant failed and refused to cook plaintiff's meals, and that on numerous and divers occasions she left home and associated with other men and has frequently attended parties with other men, also took automobile rides with other men, remaining out late at night on account of joy rides, consequently plaintiff asks the court to dissolve the marriage contract.
