Discuss Current Topics Political Band Wagon.

Former senator R. F. Pittigrew, of South Dakota, prominently identified with the Democratic party in 1912, says: "After the experience of the last seven years I don't believe there will be another Democrat elected president in a hundred years. Out in my country the feeling is that if the president is not himself a candidate for renomination, he will dictate the nomination of the Democratic candidate. But whoever is named by the Democrats he will not have a chance, in my judgment."

Fort Wayne (Ind) News: "Last summer a Republican congress cut the tidy sum of \$1,685,000,000 from the estimates of President Wilson's subordinates. And yet Chairman Cummins of the Democratic party, dolorously wails of the "extravagance" of that congress! If it had followed the suggestion of the President's advisers and spent that \$1,685,000,000 just what would have Cummins have had to say, do you fancy? If economizing on democratic estimates is extravagance, just what are Democratic estimates?"

William J. Mulligan, chairman of the Knights of Columbus committee on war activities, just back from Europe, says: "Europe needs red blood more than relief, and shows symptoms of having been 'spoiled' by America's lavish assistance. The people of Europe are not as badly off as many would have Americans believe," he said. "While there are distressing conditions in places, one detects symptoms of spoiling through America's lavish assistance. Europe needs red blood rather than relief, and it would not be unacceptable if gratitude was shown to America for what she has done."

London (Eng.) Saturday Review: "The extent of the mischief wrought by President Wilson at the Paris conference is only gradually being realized by the nations, of which the last to grasp it is the British public. Mr. Wilson is a political gambler; he knew perfectly that he was acting ultra vires and defying the American Constitution in his conduct of the peace negotiations. He knew that he was bound by the Constitution to secure not only 'the advice' of the Senate before he signed a treaty, and he had neither. He also knew that, not only was the majority of the senate hostile, but that the November elections of congressmen had gone against him. He therefore determined to tie up the peace treaty and the league of nations in the same parcel, just as a clever company promoter merges a bad in a good company. It was a bold stroke, but it failed."

London (Eng.) Times: "The allies want America to ratify the treaty for many reasons of the highest moment. They want her to ratify now; they want her ratification to have the American people behind it. They would greatly prefer that she should ratify the treaty as her President and her other representatives helped to mold it and as President Wilson signed it. They think that ratification as it stands would do most for the immediate pacification of a troubled world. But if America does not now share this belief they recognize without reserve that the right of decision must be hers. If she thinks that reservations are necessary for her safety and freedom, that they are demanded by the provisions of her constitution or by the traditions of her foreign policy, they will welcome ratification by her on any reasonable terms. We are confident that this is the view of the British people and we feel almost as certain that it is the view of the French."

Dr. James L. Tryon, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, declares that an examination of the covenant of the league of nations shows that, as qualified by the league reservations, it has not been destroyed, as many people have thought, but has simply been Americanized. "Under these circumstances it is a question," continues, Dr. Tryon, "whether, from the point of view of those who prefer the covenant to the historic American plan offered by the American Institute of International Law or to any other plan, there has not been a first class mistake made in opposing the Lodge resolution and one that it may take years to correct, for sentiment for the naked covenant itself seems to be waning in this country every day. But if the covenant is lost the movement for world peace will not stop; it is too great a movement to die as the result of such failure. It will be revised with vigor in due season and new plans for reconsideration probably of more moderate character will be proposed."

The Ohio farmer who bought a reserved seat for the end of the world exercises on December 17th was as badly swindled as the voter who supported Wilson for President because he kept us out of war. But he probably wouldn't buy another ticket for the show, which proves he isn't as big a sucker as the occasional fellow who still believes the pictures on the Wilson bill-boards.
