There were three cases of Spanish influenza reported in Tillamook county this (Thursday) morning. It somewhat depends upon how cases are quarantined whether the disease will spread. There is no cause for alarm, but with strict quarantine it is thought that the disease can be kept within narrow limits, and as the wet weather appears to be somewhat favorable in preventing the disease from spreading, it is hoped that the disease will not take a firm hold in the county.

ed on February 22, 1920. Presentation of these certificates will be made under the auspices of Tillamook Post No. 47 American Le-

gion on February 22, The local post has not a complete list of names of those who enlisted from this county and died during the war, and for that reason desires the above information from relatives or friends of the deceased veterans.
