Have others on test that will complete their year in May, 1920, they will make some excellent records. These cows are bred to Golden St. Mawes Rosarie No. 161026 who won the blue ribbon at the Pacific International. His dam is Golden St. Mawes Waltz Rosarie No. 299384 who has a record of 559.39 lbs. fat, being milked only twice daily. If milked three times daily she is capable of making seven or eight hundred lbs. fat. His grand dam, St. Mawes Poppy No. 219992 on his sire's side has a record of 952 lb. fat. He is one of our great herd bulls, his daughters in the Junior Calf Class won 1st and 2nd at the Tillamook County Fair and "third" in a class of twenty junior calves at the Pacific International. We often hear dairymen say they would just as soon have a "scrub" bull. I will present the figures that show the result of a purebred sire in my herd. I started using him in 1912. His first daughter freshened in 1915. Will give the figures of each month's cheese factory test for 1914 and total amount of fat per year before any of the pure bred sire's daughters were in milk and the same for 1919:

Discuss Current Topics

Providence (R. I.) Journal, concerning President Wilson's latest avowed position on the treaty of international intercourse. In other words, I believe that the orderly course of nature can provide a better balm for the world's ills, than the panacea of smug and self-contained politicians.

Senator Capper, of Kansas, points out that just when the American people appear to be forgetting the costly error of omission committed by the government in failing to make provision for an adequate sugar supply, the profiteers clap another cant or two on the retail price and the whole miserable fiasco is again brought before the public attention. The government's refusal to purchase the Cuban crop when it was available at a reasonable price and thus provide against a sugar shortage and exorbitant price in the United States will cost the people of this country about \$1,000,000,000, is the opinion of Senator Capper. But that is not all of Senator Capper's complaint. He insists that there is plenty of sugar to be had at high prices, which is prima facie evidence that the hoarders have the situation in hand for their own special benefit. He says: "Although our exports of sugar to Great Britain alone have jumped 200 per cent and we have in recent months shipped more than 300,000,000 pounds of it to the United Kingdom, there are fairly well authenticated reports of vast hoards of sugar in New York and New Jersey." * * * Sugar at 11 cents, the war price, is tremendously scarce in these localities. But sugar at 22 and 23 cents is as plentiful as ever."

A mere scrap of paper: The league of Nations is now in operation. The covenant of the league requires that in case of any war or threat of war affecting any nation whether a member of the league or not, the Council of the League, shall take action to end the dispute, and provision is made for an economic boycott of any nation which refuses to accept the decision of the league. Russia is now at war with Poland and Roumania, members of the league, but is not summoned to the bar of the league, and instead of being made an object of a boycott, the nations that control the League Council have announced a material modification of the partial blockade heretofore maintained against Russia, which will be useful to Russia in waging war on two members of the league. In other words it is evident that the league of nations is regarded by the powers which have joined it as a mere "scrap of paper."

Harrisburg, (Pa) Telegraph. "The supreme council at Paris has a sort of final job for Uncle Sam has made known to the American Ambassador at Paris that the Allied and Associated Powers would make no change in the award of only two percent of the German Shipping to the United States. Our Ambassador promptly replied that the United States preferred to waive its claim entirely. Your Uncle Samuel doesn't appear to be quite as popular in Paris just now as he was in the spring of 1917, but we still observe great readiness upon the part of our Allied Associates in the war to accept some billions of dollars in loans and gifts, and food supplies of every sort. A distinguished economist has recently been quoted as saying that we ought not to pose as the rich uncle for all our former associates indefinitely; that we are exceeding all reasonable limits in our rather generous attitude toward those whom we materially aided in making the world more or less safe for democracy."

Santa Cruz, (Calif.) Sentinel: "Some hot headed Democrats have begun to urge the abolition of the United States Senate. They are spreading their propagandist broadcast, endeavoring to show that this body has outgrown its usefulness, and has become a mere obstruction in the path of progress and efficiency. No one is taking the campaign very seriously, but it should be quashed at once, for it leads along a path fraught with danger for the continuance of the constitutional guarantees for a democratic government. The constitution provides for the Senate as one branch of the government—the branch in which each state shall have equal representation. To destroy it would be to destroy the whole constitution, for that document particularly provides that the equal representation therein provided for shall be irrevocable. To destroy the senate, the constitution would have to be abolished—an amendment would not suffice. But we forget. What is the constitution of the New York World, or rather adherents of Wilson? They have been advocating the unqualified passage of an instrument of international government that would nullify parts of the constitution if left to the interpretation of an international council. The constitution means nothing to them. It is an antiquated instrument of government, which now blocks the way in favor of an autocratic dictatorship is still very small—it is made up of the most part of fanatical Democratic editors who have lost all sense of balance. So we do not believe in worrying so much about it."

Dr. S. P. Orth, professor of political science at Cornell University writes: "The treaty is composed of two parts the treaty proper, with Germany and the covenant of the so called League of Nations. The very great majority of sensible American citizens desired that the two be kept separate. If that had been done, the treaty would have been ratified long ago and time could have been devoted to the careful rearing of an adequate international structure, a task that at best can evolve very slowly. However, for reasons best known to himself and which are just now being disclosed, the President of the United States, who, through the conduct of events held the balance of power in his hands, desired to so intermingling the treaty with the covenant that they are virtually inseparable. He is willing, apparently, to trade the autonomy of his own nation, for an unknown quantity in the perplexing equation of world affairs. We are now, therefore, in a miserable muddle and for sheer expediency's sake, I think the treaty should be speedily adopted, amply safeguarded to protect the American nation. You will find, that no sooner is the treaty in force than the structure it rears will begin to go to pieces. And then, the King's experts and all the King's men.

Can't put the old league together again. Then when normal conditions have returned and when sane and sensible government has been restored to our nation, we can set about to re-ify the antagonistic germ that has been included in the treaty and the like-minded nations of the world can pro-

ceed, in a rational and orderly manner, to perfect the procedure of international intercourse. In other words, I believe that the orderly course of nature can provide a better balm for the world's ills, than the panacea of smug and self-contained politicians."

Frank H. Simonds: "Great interest is manifested in this country over the possible changes in British policy which may follow the arrival of Viscount Grey, of England. While in a certain sense his American visit was a failure, since he accomplished none of the things for which he came, did not see the President, see the league of nations launched, or play any public part whatsoever, Grey's visit was by no means useless, nor was his time wasted. In his brief stay in Washington the British statesman saw representatives of all parties and of all shades of feeling. He recognized clearly and grasped sympathetically the fact that opposition to the league of nations covenant, as submitted to the senate, was not primarily or exclusively partisan and it is conjectured here that, following Grey's return, there was no repetition by Lloyd George of the statement that politics had produced the failure of the treaty on this side of the water. Many talks with many Republicans gave Grey a clear view of the possession of the champions of the reservations of the Senate. Turned aside from the original purposes of his visit, the foreign secretary of foreign affairs took up the necessary task of analyzing and appraising American feeling. And it is no secret in this city that one of the controlling reasons for the viscount's return rather sooner than he had expected was his feeling that the true situation in America was not in the least understood in Europe."
