### Wandered Forty Years—Still Going.

Ben R. Eldridge, field agent for Utah, relates the following incident with reference to soliciting memberships for a cow testing association:

Soliciting subscriptions for our cow testing association we called on brother L—. The county agent explained our errand and our host listened attentively, but after a full explanation had been placed before him, he firmly declined our invitation to become a subscriber to our proposition, saying he milked the cows himself the most of the time and thought he knew about what they were doing and he always had pretty fair cows anyway.

It was my turn to say something, so I asked: "How many cows are you milking, Brother L—?" "Just now twelve, and it's about that many all the time."

"How long have you been keeping cows?"

"Oh, ever since we been on this place, about forty years now, I think."

"Your cows run along about the same, do they, or are these you now have better than those you had when you started?"

"Oh, I don't know as they are much better, but anyway they are just as good now and when I started."

And he looked very well pleased with announcing the result. That stuck me and our visit ended.

Forty years—and the herd no better than when he started. It is hoped that the herd was good in the beginning, but that an uninteresting and uneventful forty-year period it must have been and how different from the report we have just received from another dairyman who has been keeping production records of his herd for six years. The table below shows the production and increased profits of this herd. It requires only a few minutes each day to get data of this kind on a herd, and all things considered it is well paid for as any other labor on the farm. Study this table and draw your own conclusions:

**Butterfat Production.**  
1st year, 11 cows, total Amt. 4956 lbs. average per cow, 292 lbs.  
2nd year, 17 cows, total Amt. 5663 lb. average per cow, 333 lbs. gain over 1st year 41 lbs.  
3rd year, 16 cows, total Amt. 5187 lbs. average per cow, 324 lbs. gain over 1st year 32 lbs.  
4th year, 18 cows, total Amt. 6654 lbs. gain over first year, 78 lbs.  
5th year, 19 cows, total Amt. 7161 lbs. average per cow, 377 lbs. gain over first year, 85 lbs.  
6th year, 19 cows, total Amt. 7161 lbs. average per cow, 382 lbs. gain over first year, 90 lbs.

Average gain over first year, 99 lbs. for 29 cows means an increase of 1899 lbs. or butter fat at 20 cents per pound, which equals \$379.80. Does it pay to keep records? The owner of this herd says it does. "Are you a wanderer? Our testing period for 1920 begins March 1, so file your applications for membership for the testing Association at once. We have received record breaking prices for butterfat, and our aim now should be to make record making individual butterfat productions. Help make the dairy herds of Tillamook County as famous as our cheese."

#### The Annual Auto Show.

One of the features of the big coming Portland automobile show, to be held in the Ice Palace, will be the display of closed car models. At least one-third, perhaps even one-half of the 176 models to be shown, will be of the enclosed type.

It doesn't require a very long memory to remember back to the days when the only closed automobiles in this part of the country were taxicabs or costly limousines, ownership of which automatically rated a man as a millionaire. In those days folks on the street used to speculate as to how much he paid his chauffeur when the great man rolled up in his limousine.

But times have changed. Nowadays there are closed cars within reach of the purse of even the very moderate income. And the day when such a vehicle could be driven only by a paid chauffeur in uniform also is past. In those times the closed car owner drives his own.

They make 'em in all sizes and styles now—coupe, brogtman, victoria, sedan and variations thereof, all of which will be on exhibition at the Portland show in many different makes of cars. And today the closed type of automobile is pushing the open car hard in popularity; so hard that approximately 40 percent of the

entire output of automobiles are now closed cars, with the tendency to build even more of that type.

The reason for this trend to the closed car is easily to diagnose. The closed automobile combines comfort with utility in a manner with which the open car can never compete. Modern engineering methods have reduced the weight of automobile chassis and body to such an extent that it is no longer necessary to make a closed car weigh half as much as a locomotive. In fact, the latest models weigh surprisingly little more than the open cars and can go anywhere that an open car goes, with infinitely more comfort in disagreeable weather.

The number of entries of closed cars already made for the Portland automobile show emphasizes the trend of the present day. The visitor to the big show will see, however, not all the very latest types of closed cars, but the latest models of open cars as well.

In all, 69 different makes of passenger automobiles will be on display, and 176 different models.

Still another feature of the Portland show is the truck show held in connection with it. For the first time on the Pacific Coast, a show will be devoted exclusively to trucks.

The truck section of the show will be held in the Portland Armory, only a few blocks from the Ice Palace, and one ticket will admit the visitor to both shows without additional cost. There will be 50 different makes of trucks on display, and approximately 100 different models.
