With the passing of the new Sweet Bill it is now possible for a disabled service man to be eligible for compensation even though he were dis charged as early as April 6th, 1917. On December 24th, the same day that the Sweet Bill became a law by the President's signature, the Bureau of War Risk Insurance mailed out 1,065 checks totaling \$799,-580.61, to men whose cases became compensable on that day for the first time under the retroactive features of the new law. All checks mailed since December 20th should be on the basis of the new law Under the Sweet Bill increase in compensation is authorized as follows That if inability results from
