The dairymen have built up a great industry and by their efforts to produce a high grade cheese, they have made the name of the home product famous. It is not out of place for the editor to commend the dairymen for the splendid result of last year, we know how a large number were handicapped for want of help, but with true Western grit they put forth renewed efforts without one word of complaint, and what increase was made in their finances they are justly entitled to it. It is work and industry that counts and this, too, we are glad to say, had a good deal to do in making Tillamook cheese famous.

Does Cow Testing Pay? The Tillamook Cow Testing Association has been in continuous operation for eight years and should, therefore, show definite results, either positive or negative. Talk with any of the men who have been in since the start and you will find them very sure that it pays and pays big. Compare the association average production for 1918 with the average production of the cows not in associations that year. The association cows in the county, this includes both associations, averaged 675 lbs. milk and 267 lbs. butter fat. The other cows outside the associations made an average of 425 lbs. milk and 177 lbs. fat. This extra 90 lbs. of fat at 75c. per lb. amounts to \$67.50 or over 2000 per cent interest on the initial outlay for testing. What will pay bigger dividends? The Tillamook Association will pay an average for 1919 right around 350 lbs. butter fat. In other words the association records allow you to persistently increase in production. We had 1450 cows in the Tillamook Association in 1919 which was the largest number in any association in the state. I understand that one of the Coos associations is recognized with 1585 cows signed up.

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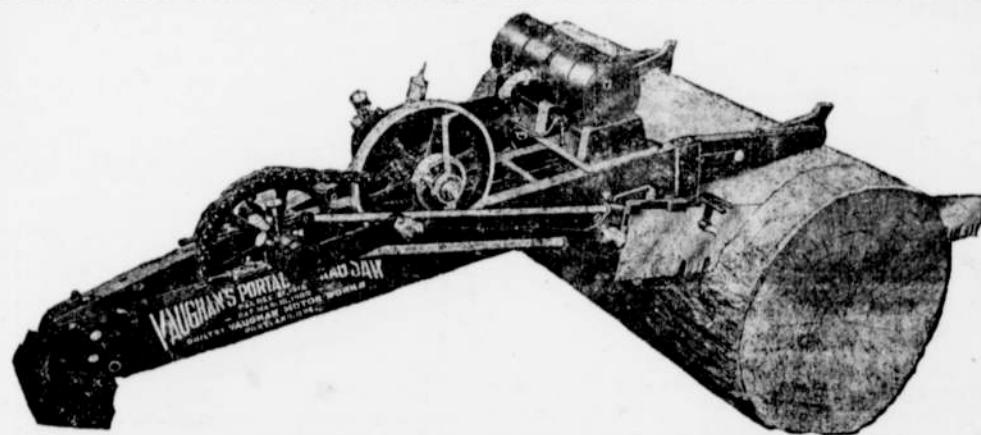

ELECTION NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, on the 14th day of February, 1920, a Special Election has been called and will be held at the City Hall in Tillamook City, on Thursday, March 4th, 1920, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified electors of Tillamook City for their adoption or rejection a measure, authorizing the issuance of General City Bonds to the amount of not more than \$15,000.00. The proceeds from the sale of such bonds to be applied by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, so far as shall be required for that purpose, to the purchase of a Fire Engine and fire fighting equipment for the use of Tillamook City, Oregon.

Said measure being proposed by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, being in words and figures as follows, to-wit: "A MEASURE TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF TILLAMOOK CITY, OREGON BY ADDING THERETO AN ARTICLE TO BE DESIGNATED AS ARTICLE XV, AUTHORIZING A BOND ISSUE FOR THE PURCHASE OF FIRE ENGINE AND FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT."

Section 1: That the Charter of Tillamook City, Oregon as enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon in the year 1893 and as thereafter amended be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following article: ARTICLE XV. Section 1: The Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, is hereby authorized to issue and sell the general bonds of Tillamook City to the amount of not more than \$15,000.00. The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be applied by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, so far as shall be required, for that purpose, to the purchase of a fire engine and fire fighting equipment for the use of Tillamook City, the indebtedness to be evidenced by said bonds being hereby authorized to be incurred in addition to any indebtedness heretofore authorized to be incurred by the Charter of Tillamook City. The purchasers of the bonds hereby authorized shall not be required to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

Section 2: The bonds hereby authorized shall be issued in accordance with the Charter provisions of Tillamook City, except that it is hereby provided that the ordinance or other act of the Council providing for the issuing of said bonds shall not be subject to the referendum provisions of the Charter of Tillamook City, and such referendum provisions are hereby declared not to be applicable to the bonds authorized to be issued under the provisions of this article. The rate of interest on said bonds shall

not exceed six per cent per annum, and they shall not be sold for less than the par value thereof, with all accrued interest to date of payment therefore by the purchasers." That legal voter who votes for the adoption or rejection of said measure shall

PROPOSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL

Shall a measure entitled "A Measure to Amend the Charter of Tillamook City, Oregon, by adding thereto an article to be designated as Article XV, authorizing a bond issue for the purchase of fire engine and fire fighting equipment" as proposed by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, referred to the people of said city for adoption or rejection by resolution adopted by said Council on the 16th day of February, 1920, be adopted. This is a measure to amend the Charter of Tillamook City by adding thereto Article XV authorizing the issuance and sale of general bonds of Tillamook City to the amount of \$15,000.00, for raising funds for the purchase of a fire engine and fire fighting equipment.
